## NFAA Annual Meeting – Riviera Hotel Las Vegas

The annual meeting of the National Field Archery Association Board of Directors was held at the Riviera Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, during 4-6 February 2007. This meeting is scheduled in the days just before the World Archery Festival at the same facility. All but three of the States were represented by their NFAA State Director or an alternate.

Bruce Cull led off the meeting with a “State of the NFAA” report, including relationship between the NFAA and other organizations such as US Archery (NAA), Pope and Young, and National Alliance for the Development of Archery (NADA), a financial report, and a membership analysis. He also addressed the NFAA Bowhunter programs, which include the Art Young Big Game and Small Game Awards, the National 3-D, and Bowhunter Jamboree, plus conservation and hunting rights lobbying. Information was provided about the Bowhunter Liability Insurance. Mr. Cull also presented an overview of the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP) and the follow-on After School Archery Program (ASAP), which is designed to be complementary to the in-school course. Several of these items were to be covered in more detail later in the week.

The remainder of the first day was given to the various committees (Council, Admin, Competition I, Competition II, and Equipment) to consider their assigned Agenda Items. The NFAA Director report will address major Agenda Items which passed.

The second day started with a briefing by Roy Grimes (KY Department of Fish and Wildlife) on the status of NASP. The teacher training path includes the Basic Archery Instructor (BAI), the Basic Archery Instructor Trainer (BAIT), and the Trainer Specialist. Current goals include getting one or more Specialists designated in each state, to keep the Instructor pipeline moving. Another goal is to get NASP in all 50 states. South Dakota became #42 in February, Hawaii will have their kickoff in April, and Connecticut in September. The holdouts are NM, NY, MA, RI, VT, and DE – primarily eastern states. Canada will receive training in June.

2007 will see the first stand-alone national NASP tournament – the first four annual events were piggybacked with the KY State. The date is 9 June 2007, and location is the Louisville KY Fairgrounds. School Teams and Individuals must qualify to attend the NASP National, based on their placement or score achieved at the State Championship. (The Washington NASP Championship will be Saturday 28 April in Yakima). Each state’s first place team is qualified for Nationals, plus any Elementary teams with scores of 2500+ points, Junior High teams of 2600+, and High School teams of 2700+ points for the 12-person team. In addition, the first through fifth place individuals in each category are qualified, regardless of their team standing or score.

Some NASP statistics are: Four states have a full-time (paid) coordinator; In 36 (of the 41 states with active programs) the State Coordinator is in their Fish and Wildlife or similar state agency; Nine of the states have 100+ schools in NASP. Goals include expansion into all 50 states, getting state Wildlife Agency lead in additional states, reaching the 100 school threshold in each state in three years from launch, and introduction of NASP in other countries.

With February past, and March beginning, we are transitioning from Indoor to Outdoor shooting. Some Clubs have already hosted outdoor 3-D events, we are continuing the Indoor Blueface Mail-In, and during March we will compete in the State, Sectional, and National Indoor Championships. There are two locations for the WSAA Championship, Bow and Spokane, on 3-4 March. There is one (or more) locations for the Sectional in each state in the Northwest Section. The two most practical for Washington residents are our own location at KBH Archers in Belfair on 17-18 March, and Oregon's location at Archers Afield in Tigard on 10-11 March. With two sites **and** two dates, there are lots of opportunities to make this event. Results from these two sites and the others will be combined to determine the sectional winners. We hope you are already pre-registered for these events!

This issue included the registration form / advertisement for the WSAA Target Championship, 14-15 April at Skookum Archers' range in Puyallup. This is our first Outdoor Championship of the calendar year. Please remember that for the Blueface Indoor, the Target, and for the Field coming in July, all participants must be members of NFAA (in addition to WSAA) to be eligible for awards.

Hunters, thanks for the stories and photos which provide a little extra interest and variety to the past couple issues. Remember to apply for your WSAA and / or NFAA Big Game Awards to have a lasting memory of your successful hunt.

We are getting excited about the NFAA Outdoor National Championship to be held at Darrington Archers range during 23-27 July. This is planned to be the last of the true five-day events, with all five rounds counting toward identifying the high-scoring winners.

The community of Darrington has lined up some support to feed the hundreds of archers and their family members: Breakfast will be served Monday through Friday during the tournament, 6 AM to 9 AM in the Community Center. There will also be dinner options: Monday will be Meatloaf (with salads, vegetables, desserts and beverages), and Wednesday will be a Chicken Dinner at the Senior Center. A Bar-B-Que at the Old School Park is the highlight of Tuesday evening. Thursday, the Barebow Fraternity picnic is on the agenda, open to all who shoot a bow without sights (Barebow, Bowhunter, or Traditional). The rest of us might plan something on our own.

Several of the Clubs or Shops from around the state have signed up to help prepare the ranges and perform Range Captain duties during the shoot. The responsibilities include cleaning the lanes, putting in the shooting stakes, and coordinating with the Club if any bales need repair or replacement. The preparation can be done anytime before July 12 – bring a crew to make it light work. One or more Range Captains must be on site through the week of the shoot – you can share the responsibilities with a buddy and maybe even get in a little shooting of your own. Two half-ranges (14-target units) are left to be adopted: Cougar 15-28 and Bobcat 15-28. Contact David and Mary Nations to volunteer ([dmtarhill@glacierview.net](mailto:dmtarhill@glacierview.net)).

## Interagency Committee for Outdoor Recreation Grants Available

The Interagency Committee for Outdoor Recreation (IAC) agreed to double the grant limit to \$100,000 for this year's Firearms and Archery Range Recreation (FARR) Program because of a record amount of available money. FARR grants may be used for acquisition, development, and renovation of facilities for firearms and archery range recreation. IAC staff initiated an outreach effort to generate more interest in the FARR program.

# HUNTING COMMUNITY NEWS

## BOWHUNTER EDUCATION: Annette Crews

Elk hunting in the northwest can be a matter of stepping into the nearest woods. We here are very fortunate to have an abundant renewable resource such as the elk! They have learned to adapt to almost any environment but they have lost much habitat with the urban sprawl. Just last week Brent (Team Instructor) saw 35 elk on a lawn inside the city limits of Kelso!

The access to the hunting has become a major problem on the west side, with private land owners locking out the early archers due to fire danger.

So, we don't hang around all summer hoping they won't close the woods, we do our scouting in areas to which we will have access. The National Forests in Washington State cover thousands of acres and provide bountiful hunting and opportunity for scouting. This is where your summer camping trips come in, and don't forget that fly rod!

Learning the area you want to hunt is half the job and most the fun! Pay attention to where you see elk and where they go to when pushed out of an area. Take notes! Use trail cameras. Be there opening morning.

Most elk hunters use their calls too loudly. If you think the elk aren't rutting or calling in early September, you're wrong. Our elk start rutting around the 20th of August. Then the majority of cows come into heat September 15th or so. The ones who don't get bred come into heat again in October, and again in November. What does affect the elk in September is the heat. Then rutting activities commence in the cooler night time. Also affecting it is more traffic in the woods, grouse and bear hunters are out there too. Traffic will make the elk shut up faster than a bad elk caller!

If you watch TV (who me!) hunting shows you have to take them with a grain of salt. Many of the hunts are on private land, some high fenced land. The hunter who is out there standing in front of the brush without any camo to hide his / her hands, face and especially bright arrow fletches can't expect the elk not to see the hunter and spook. We need to share that with our students. Also TV hunters are walking and stalking through the woods with an arrow nocked! Most the time we have time to stop and nock up when we see the elk.

Smokey's success last year on his 6x6 was partly due to hunting pressure. That is - there were so many more hunters in our area that it pushed him and I further into the woods! Funny huh! This was an area we had always planned to hunt, but were previously successful out side of it and had never ventured in further!

Keep your calling modest and the wind in your favor!

If you have cabin fever go to Goggle Earth and down load the free program and explore places you want to hunt. It's the next best thing to being there!

**Bowhunter Schedules:** Bowhunter Education Classes are available to everyone in our state; however you need to let us know if an interest in holding a class exists in your area and we will be glad to schedule a class near you.

Taking a class will improve your success rate, it's a proven fact. When many minds get together we all learn something!

## Last Day Doe By John Hill, Co-written by Laura Hill

It was the last few days of hunting season, and I had come up empty-handed every time before. A fresh snow had fallen the last few days, and the world was perfect for one last attempt to appease my family and finally bring something home. Dan and I decided on one last attempt and set out together, hoping two sets of eyes and bows would be better than one. We trekked up a steep hill not too far from home, and found some nice fresh tracks around the mountain, but unfortunately didn't see anything. Feeling defeated for the moment, we returned home for a bit of lunch and time to regroup. With full bellies and a new game plan, we drove back to our little mountain and parked the truck around one side, hiking up far enough to get away from it, and yet still remain within a comfortable distance. Much to our surprise this was no normal slope, it was an old skid road, used only by animals now, and about a forty degree angle the whole way up.

As we neared the top, a doe stood up to my left and offered me a perfect shot, which I didn't waste time thinking about. I drew, sighted, let my arrow fly and hoped for the best. The arrow connected with the doe in a perfect broadside shot! She jumped up in the air and dashed off down the hill. Dan and I high fived and celebrated as quietly as we could. We looked at our watches, and decided not to wait to retrieve her. Because of the shot placement and the approaching darkness, we chose to go after her. As we stared down the hill after the doe, the blood trail was incredible, straight out of the text book. The snow helped accentuate it and every five yards, every pause the deer had made, we saw more and more, so we knew she could not get far. But the hill was so steep that she probably went at least one hundred yards skidding and sliding straight down the hill.

The last five yards looked like a kids sledding slope, smooth and debris-free, with our doe piled at the bottom. After finding her, we shared more high fives and started the field dressing work, talking about our options to get her out as we did. The way back up where we came from was impossible because of the steep slope, the snow, and the hour, made all the worse when we realized neither of us had thought to bring a drag rope. Dan sacrificed his t-shirt and tied it round the deer's neck, hoping to make the trek a bit easier. We could see the bottom of the hill with a private house, but fearing the opinions the owners may have, we chose the side hill option, thinking it wouldn't take us that long to just round the hill. We soon came to regret that decision.

Dan chose to drag the deer and I took both our bows, and he had to drag the deer through literal jungle, over and under logs, across creeks, through thorns, stepping through snow patches that concealed knee-high holes. A hike that normally should have taken minutes ended up taking two hours. This whole time we were within sight of the pavement that would lead us back to my truck, and we finally came to a flat bit of ground that would hopefully lead us there. Just when we thought we had reached the home stretch, we found ourselves on a huge rock with a twenty-foot drop down to the flat. With both of us exhausted and clearly not thinking straight, Dan hurled the deer over the cliff and said "Now all we have to do is go get her". Stuck with no other options, we slid down on our backsides down to the flat, and then realized we hadn't seen where the deer had landed. We dug around a bit in the descending darkness, and we found the deer with a sigh of relief when Dan nearly tripped over it. We started off again, looking to the right to that private field, and to the left was about one hundred yards to the road the truck was on. As you can imagine, our legs were not very useful anymore, turning into jelly with each agonizing step. Just when we didn't think the going could get any worse we ran into a swamp. We tried to negotiate our way through it, while also trying to stay mostly dry.

Finally we got to where we could see the road, with the safety of the truck not too far beyond. I took one more step toward to road, and sank into thigh-deep mud. I put my other foot down to try and get out, and that one sank, too. But at least someone was enjoying the show, Dan laughing behind me and calling "You need help?!" all while I was carrying both of our bows. I should have sunk his in the swamp, would have served him right for laughing at a fat guy stuck in the mud. Finally I was able to crawl out on my hands and knees to a patch dry enough to hold me. From there I did my best to leap over the swamp to the road, and thankfully landed on solid ground. After the last short five-yard drag to the road, Dan and I shared another short celebration that we had made it out alive. But another bolt of realization struck as we remembered that the truck was still two switchbacks up the hill and someone had to go get it.

That someone was me, naturally, seeing as it was my truck. So sore legs and all, I left Dan and the equipment and the deer at the road and started off after the truck. After that terrible hike, my legs hurt so badly I could only go five or six steps at a time before I had to stop and let the muscles loosen up. After the longest fifteen minutes of my life, I saw the salvation that was my grey truck in the distance, and the last twenty yards I had to walk completely stiff-legged. I rested on the driver seat of my truck, trying to get my knees to bend enough to where I could use the pedals. I managed to drive back to Dan, the gear and our deer, and we loaded up and drove home for a well-deserved cold one and lots of Advil. This was one "last day" doe I will never forget. I don't think my legs will let me.

The Indoor Multi-Color Mail-In Championship consists of six rounds, usually shot over a period of six weeks, during the months of December and January. The Location Reporter mails scores each week to the Tournament Vice President who tabulates scores from all locations.

The distance shot is 18 meters, using the multi-color 40 cm. indoor target, or three-spot target face. PeeWees shoot at 9 meters. Each round shot consists of 10 ends of three arrows each, total 30 arrows. Scoring 10, 9, 8 ... down to 1 for the single-spot target, or 10 through 6 for the three-spot face. Hits in the X-ring are recorded and are part of the official score (for tie-breakers). Maximum score for the six-round series would be 1800 points with 180 X's.

An impressive 195 archers participated in this year's MC Mail shoot, but only 147 completed the required six rounds. The number of places awarded in a Division is based on the "unit rule" for the registered shooters. Due to available space in The Quiver, only the individual's high score, total score, total X's, and placing are reported here. Also, those who registered but did not complete all six rounds are not listed. Full results will be posted on the WSAA Website [www.crispie.com/wsaa](http://www.crispie.com/wsaa) in the Tournament / Mail-In section.

## NEWS FROM THE NFAA CONVENTION: by TC Parker

Here is a quick summary of some of the Agenda Items which passed at the 2007 NFAA Annual Meeting.

1. Life members who reach the age of 55 will pay the same registration fees as younger members. Those Life Members who became life members prior to 2007 will, at the age of 55, be grandfathered into the free registration for Sectionals and Nationals, provided that there are no late fees involved.
  2. No more disputes allowed. Protests only and pay your \$25.00.
  3. The Outdoor National will be a 5/3 day format with a Monday thru Friday schedule.
  4. Effective 1 June 2007 NFAA Dues increase to Head of Household \$35, 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> add \$5 and 3<sup>rd</sup> or more \$3 each.
  5. Ties for 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> in any Championship Flight at any National Tournament will be broken by a shoot-off. (makes you wonder why we keep count of Xs)
  6. All shoot-offs will take place on the practice range at the furthest distance for the age division, using the 65cm field or hunter target. Score & Xs will be counted. If still tied, continue until tie is broken.
  7. The following rounds have been DELETED from the list of official rounds. These rounds can still be shot by the clubs and State, but are not considered official rounds.
    - a. Expert Field Round
    - b. 300 (15-target) Field, Hunter, Animal rounds.
    - c. Indoor Championship Round
    - d. American 810 round
    - e. Freeman Round, Freeman Bowhunter Round.
  8. The following have been ADDED to the list of official rounds
    - f. Lake of the Woods round
    - g. 600 Target round
    - h. Classic 600 Target round
  9. Definition of Bowhunter Freestyle has been modified. Effect is that beginning 1 June 2007 the STS shock suppressor and other similar systems becomes legal for the Bowhunter Freestyle and Bowhunter Freestyle Limited divisions
- There are a few other minor changes plus some admin changes which will appear in the next issue of Archery magazine.



## Roosevelt Elk Festival in the Quinault Rain Forest – Saturday, 17 March 2007

Lake Quinault, Washington -- Members of Lake Quinault's Community Action Forum have announced that Lake Quinault will be hosting their third Annual Quinault Rain Forest Roosevelt Elk Festival on Saturday, March 17th of this year. The Lake Quinault Community is teaming up with the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife – Coastal Region 6 Office – to promote "Watchable Wildlife" programs by hosting the Roosevelt Elk Festival.

The one-day festival will include a Wine and Cheese Social Friday night at the Lake Quinault Lodge, breakfast Saturday morning at the Rain Forest Resort Village, two guided interpretive Roosevelt Elk Tours in the Quinault Rain Forest and a buffet banquet dinner and dessert at the Lake Quinault Lodge Saturday evening. Guided interpretive hiking tours, museum tours, naturalist and photography trips, vendor booths, raffle drawings, door prizes, giveaways, special programs for kids, as well as visitor information about the Lake Quinault area and the Quinault Rain Forest will be part of the festival's weekend program. Several speakers will also lecture throughout the weekend on big game habitat, conservation, management, history and education. Festival activities begin on Saturday morning. The festival is designed for all ages and abilities.

The Quinault Rain Forest is home to six champion conifer trees. These trees are recognized by the National Forestry Association as the largest living specimens of their species. Guided interpretive hiking tours of the World's Largest Sitka Spruce Tree, located at the Rain Forest Resort Village, World's Largest Western Red Cedar, located near the Lake Quinault Resort on North Shore, and several of the World's Largest Douglas Firs located on the Quinault Loop Trail will also take place on Saturday afternoon.

The Quinault Rain Forest is also home to World Class Salmon and Steelhead fishing. In 2004, a visiting angler, guided by a local Quinault guide George Rose, caught what might have been the Washington State Steelhead Record on the Upper Quinault River. The angler released the Steelhead back into the wild, which measured 46" long, 24" around and approx. 35 lbs. During the festival participants will have the opportunity to meet local guides and outfitters in order to learn more about the local fishery and inquire about booking a trip. Information about the Fifth Annual Quinault Rain Forest Mushroom Festival to be held in October 2007 and the Quinault Rain Forest Bald Eagle Festival to be held in December 2007 will round out the weekend.

Elk Festival participant costs are \$40.00 for adults and \$20.00 for children 6-17 years of age. Children 5 and under are free. Participants may register and pay the festival fee with the Lake Quinault Lodge. Registration will also be available Saturday morning, prior to departing for breakfast at the Rain Forest Resort Village. Participants will receive a "2006 Elk Festival Button" (designed by local Quinault artist, Heidi Bennett) which will be used as their "pass" for the weekend festivities.

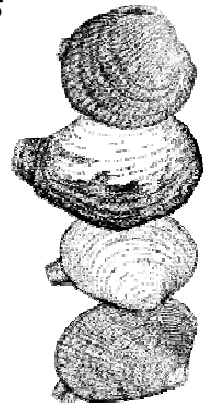

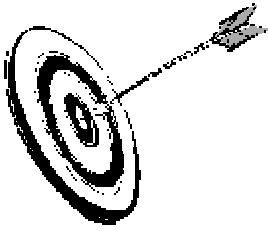

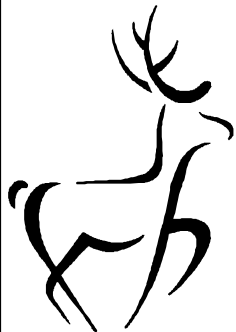
