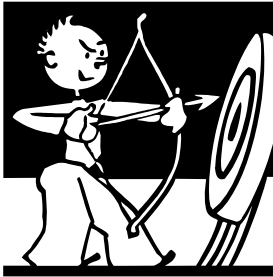

Update on the Arrow Size Restriction discussion: At the Hartford tournament, a survey was taken by putting these three questions on the back of the Sunday scorecard.

Question #2 - If Yes, what size? *Following are the choices offered and number who chose that option.*

23 series (2315 implied) = 107

Larger than 23 = 100

22 series = 3

23 series = 81

24 series = 7

25 series = 9

26 series = 36

27 series = 48

9.3 mm size = 16

Question #3 - What size arrow are you shooting today?

14 series = 3

17 series = 8

19 series = 8

22 series = 9

23 series = 34

25 series = 32

26 series = 63

27 series = 45

Other interesting findings.

Number of those wishing to have the restricted size the same size they shoot now = 102

Those wishing to have a restricted size smaller than they shoot now = 41

Those wishing to have a restricted size larger than they shoot now = 58

(FYI the 9.3 mm is the same size as the Easton 2315)

BOWHUNTER EDUCATION: By Annette Crews, WBEP State Chairman

As we all look forward to hunting season you might be interested in knowing that currently 16 states and many foreign countries require that you take the International Bowhunter Education class to hunt their lands. When you apply for an out-of-state hunt be sure to inquire about the requirements. If you apply for a tag in a state that requires the class, don't wait to see if you drew the tag before taking the opportunity to attend a class. Every year in late July we have someone who just found out that they had to have this class and then they end up traveling many miles and sometimes out of state to get the class before they go hunting, such as the two gentlemen from Nevada whom I taught a few years ago.

Classes are approximately ten hours, spread out over several nights or a weekend. They are taught by trained instructors with a minimum of three years of bowhunting experience, and actually most have ten years or more.

What is a typical class agenda?

Classes have field training on Tree Stand Placement and Safety, Equipment Handling, Calling game in close, How to hunt effectively and ethically, Shot Placement, Blood Trailing, Wild Game Identification, Scouting, Map Reading, Survival, First Aid, and much more.

Every club in the state should put aside a weekend for their members to have an opportunity to attend a class in their club house or at their range. Many of the instructors would be glad to travel to wherever you are to teach a class and it would be lots of fun for the whole club! We will be setting up the '09 schedules by the end of September so call us if you want to sponsor a class!

So far this year our teams have taught sixty-one regular class students and thirty Distance Learning Program students.

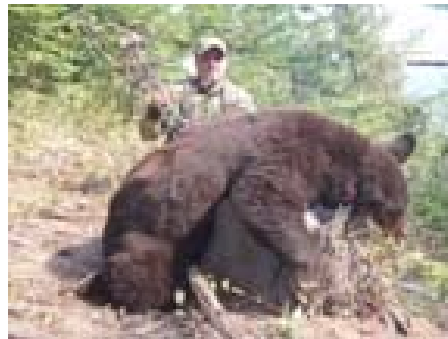
But it's much more than that. It illustrates how Bows and Arrows have fascinated man kind sense the beginning. To this day ... thousands of years later, the Bow and Arrow is alive and well all around the world. Boys and girls, men and women of all ages come together and compete in local, State, National and International Competitions. The Olympics showcase the best there is in the World's Oldest Sport.

So ... What made the eleven year old choose Bow and Arrows as a subject for his book report? None of his family circle was interested in Bows and Arrows. At that time there was no NASP. (National Archery in School Program) Had their been, I'm sure he would have been at the head of the class. Perhaps he saw a movie about Robin Hood? We'll just call it the MYSTIC that has kept Archery alive and well for thousands of years.

MYSTIC??? Or what ever ... The interest that spawned the Book Report turned into a fascination with Bows and Arrows. The Fascination turned into a Passion for Bows and Arrows.

Congratulation to James Petker. May we all find and live our passion.

Today as a young man James passion for archery is still with him. He is a past President of SILVER ARROW BOWMEN of Mount Vernon, Washington. He was instrumental in founding the Northwest Buckle Shoot. (A 3-D target competition which the winners receive a really nice belt buckle) and he is a fanatic for archery hunting. He has won the HUNTER OF THE YEAR award at Silver Arrow for the past five years. If he's not hunting, you can be assured that he's planning a hunt or practicing for an archery tournament.



Below is the transcribed book report that James wrote in seventh grade. The report launched a life long passion for the sport of ARCHERY.....

BOWS AND ARROWS By James Petker 7th Grade

People started using the Bow and Arrow from the Mesolithic period (C. 1000-6000 B.C.). It was used for hunting and war. During the Middle Ages it was still used for hunting and war. A bow consisted of flexible stave with a cord fastened to both ends. There are three basic forms of a bow. The Self-Bow is made of one homogeneous piece of material. A built bow is made of joined pieces of the same material. A composite bow is made of different materials. During the Medieval times they used the Self Bow. The bow was usually made yew, elm, ash, or wychelm wood. The bow was the full height of the wielder. The rope which was used for a handle was made of wool, silk. Or if you were very very rich cotton, which was only available from Egypt at that time. The string, which was used to tighten the bow to shooting position, was made of animal intestines.

Practice took place Sundays and holidays next to the church courtyard.

The longbow was approximately 1.8 meters long and had a shooting capacity of 275 to 400 yards. A good archer could hit a target from ninety meters.

The short bow was about 1.2 meters long and had a maximum range of 300 to 400 yards. A good archer could hit a target from ninety meters. This bow was used while mounted on a horse.

The arrow was a three to four foot stick with fletches on it, which are feathers. They were grey, down goose feathers, until Chaucer's yeoman had arrows with peacock feathers. At the end of the arrow, behind the fleches was a notch so that a bowstring could fit loosely in the notch. The tips on an arrow depended on what it was used for. A broadhead was used for hunting and war. In later examples of arrows, the tips became more slender so that they were more accurate and could hit a Knight at his joints.

Bows and arrows in the Middle Ages were one of the best, most effective weapons to use. Even children were taught how to use bows and arrows. They were used to help the people hunt for food.

NASP, WOW there's a lot going on! Starting with the most recent excitement, you missed a great shoot if you weren't at the WSAA State 3-D Championship at Silver Arrow! Along with Alpine Archery and a whole host of others, Silver Arrow Bowmen put together the best 3-D WSAA has seen in many years.

Alpine Archery donated two of their youth bows and a one-of-a-kind bow from their premium series to Silver Arrow for them to raffle off. Silver Arrow decided to provide the proceeds of the raffle to NASP to help another school in their area begin the NASP program. Thanks to the quality of the bows and dedication of the archers, NASP will receive \$800 to help start another program in the Mount Vernon area.

I would like to come to your club or shop to talk about NASP and after-school youth archery programs. I received many questions this past weekend from people excited about helping to get NASP started in their communities and how to get the NASP kids out to their clubs to see all

that archery has to offer. Our clubs and shops are the next step in getting the most bang for the buck as we promote the school program. Drop me a line or give me a call and let's set a date. We will be pushing this program over the top this year. Now is the time for you to begin planning for how your group will support the growth.

The WDFW NASP budget proposal has been accepted by the agency and is now in the hands of the Legislative Liaison. I don't expect to hear much more from them until the first of the year, at which time we should find out how it will be presented to the legislature for approval. As it stands, if approved, this budget will provide nearly \$50,000 for school equipment and \$35,000 for a WSAA service contract to help us continue to provide the support that has made this program as successful as it is out of the pockets of us archers.

The **Natural Resource Youth Camp** (NRYC) at Cispus had a smaller turn-out this year with less than 40 kids making two classes but that worked out OK. The Hunter Ed air gun guys were not able to attend this year because of their In-Service

Training Day so we had the kids all day. Annette Crews, Mike Fennelly and I spent almost three hours with each group. We went through the entire NASP training process and ended with a balloon breaking contest. Even after three hours in the morning session, several kids traded their afternoon activity to come back for another archery session!

Personal note: As you do these events year after year you begin to recognize many of the kids from previous years. Especially the ones that would please you most if they went home! This year I was pleased to observed one girl and two boys at Cispus that fit the "go home" category in previous years but had noticeably improved maturity and attitudes this year! There is hope.

The **Green River Gobblers JAKES** event had approximately 60 kids in three different age groups each spend an hour with Dave Garrison and me. This is a fast-paced and fun event that includes a fishing pond with some really big fish for the kids to catch. A big shout out to Cedar River Bowmen who have taken care of this event for WSAA for several years now.

Production of The Quiver continues to work smoothly. Operation is planned to ensure material is received, edited, and set into the newsletter format, to be sent to the printer and mailed in time to be received by our members on or before the first day of each month. Both the printer and the mailing service are located in Puyallup, and my desk is (usually) in Hoquiam. This month is a little different, as I have been traveling during most of July. Evergreen Archers Host WSAA Field Championship

Evergreen Archers' range in Spokane was the site of the WSAA Field Championship on the weekend of 28-29 June. The gate was open on Thursday for a few folks who arrived early to camp at the range, and to practice a little. The courses were well-prepared, with freshly painted stakes and attractive signs. For this year's event, several folks opted to camp, as a large basketball tournament monopolized the city's hotel rooms, and the weather was warm / dry.

Saturday's schedule included 28 Field targets, followed by a 14-target Animal round. That makes for a long day of shooting, and Evergreen Archers made sure we had plenty of cold water on the range, and snacks or lunch as we passed through the registration area. Sunday, we shot 28 Hunter targets, had a quick lunch while scores were tallied, and anticipated award of the tournament plaques.

Several records were set, Pro Male Freestyle Matt Alwine with an aggregate of 1357. The high score of this year's event was chalked by Adult Male Bowhunter Freestyle Matt Schmitz with 1377 total. On the women's side, Pro Female Freestyle Crystal Parker turned in 1329. Among the juniors, we had one Youth, one Cub, and one PeeWee, but they didn't just walk away with their first place awards – each one won their event with a new record score! Two individuals swept the records for their competitive category, setting new marks for the aggregate AND for the field, animal and hunter components of this format. National Partnership to Expand Archery into Municipal Recreation Agencies

Newberry, FL, July 15, 2008: NADA (National Alliance for the Development of Archery) has signed a two-year national partnership agreement with the country's leading membership organization of municipal recreation agencies, National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA). Funding for this partnership has been provided by the Easton Sports Development Foundation II.

The purpose of the partnership is to gain a closer relationship with NRPA and greater access to their membership of municipal recreation agencies, YMCA's, military base recreation facilities and special interest recreation associations that make up the network of NRPA. It is the goal of this partnership to expand archery as a community activity in recreation departments.

The partnership is in several parts:

NRPA will facilitate funding grants to recreation agencies who qualify to start archery programs. This funding, 100 grants of \$500 each for a total of 200 grants over two years, can be used to purchase equipment or archery program materials for the After School Archery Program (ASAP) that is facilitated by NADA on behalf of National Field Archery Association and USA Archery. One hundred grants will be distributed for each of the two year partnership. NRPA will create an online application form accessible from their website, and will screen the applicants with final approval being given by NADA. Those agencies that have access to USA Archery / NFAA certified instructors in their areas will be given priority.

NRPA will provide NADA regular advertising space in their membership magazine to promote archery as a community sport, space in their website for agencies to learn about archery, and regular announcements to agencies about archery and ways to start programs.

NRPA will also consult with NADA on a regular basis to broaden ways to make archery even more accessible to recreation agencies.

For its part, NADA will create printed marketing pieces aimed at both youth and adult program leaders showing how easy it is to transition from an initial archery program in a school or camp, to ASAP and other types of long-term programs. This includes a youth handout that will guide a new archer through the transition of their initial introduction into the exciting world of archery through ASAP. A program leader booklet is also being created, that will guide the school teacher, camp director or recreation staffer on how to transition from an introductory program into longer term programs such as ASAP and clubs. Funding for these materials has also been provided by ESDF II.

The national partnership will be announced through NRPA very shortly, and will be the highlight at the NADA and NRPA booth exhibits at the annual NRPA Congress and convention in Baltimore, MD this October.

How to get involved:

If you are a certified instructor or coach, alert your local recreation agency that start-up grants are available through NRPA. Contact Chris Zink at NADA for promotional materials to help you reach these agencies.

If you are an agency, contact Chris at NADA with questions about the sport, or to NRPA to apply for a grant.

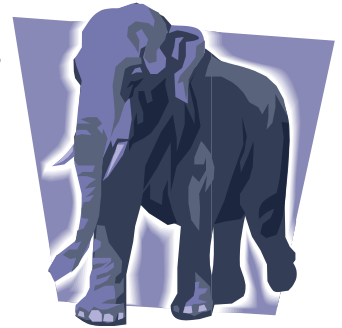

Leave Young Wildlife Alone

OLYMPIA — With summer here, the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is reminding holiday campers and those enjoying the outdoors to leave any wildlife they encounter alone.

Deer fawns, seal pups, baby birds and other young animals are visible now and too often become the victims of well-intentioned people who may not realize the harm they can cause by removing animals from the wild, said Sandra Jonker, WDFW regional wildlife program manager.

"We're receiving an increasing number of calls from people who assume they've encountered an abandoned animal, such as a deer fawn," Jonker said. "They want to rescue it, but that's just not a good idea."

Jonker said many animals, such as deer, often leave their young to forage and avoid drawing in predators. The best thing people can do is to stay away from the animal and leave the area so adults can return to their young, she said.

"People have the best intentions, but removing animals from the wild reduces their chance of survival," she said.

It also violates state law that prohibits taking wildlife out of the wild, she said. Under the law, only licensed wildlife rehabilitators can hold wildlife in captivity.

Injured or truly orphaned animals may be cared for and eventually be returned to the wild by licensed rehabilitators. Even then, Jonker noted, many don't make it successfully back into the wild.

"The best way to help young wild animals is to leave them alone, give the animals a wide berth to avoid stressing them or their parents, and restrain pets that might harass them," she said. "Cats, in particular, left to roam outdoors, can impact ground-nesting and other song birds."

Holding wildlife in captivity is a misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$1,000. For more information, see "Wildlife Viewing Ethics" on WDFW's website at <http://wdfw.wa.gov/viewing/ethics.htm>.

More than 60,000 hunters submitted 134,000 applications for this year's special hunts for species including turkey, big horn sheep, mountain goat, moose, deer and elk. Holders of the special permits can hunt at times and locations beyond those authorized by a general hunting license.

In addition to posting results of the drawing on its website, WDFW will notify successful applicants by mail. Those with hunts beginning in August will also be contacted by phone.

A Trip across the Northwest: by Linda Parker

This year (2008) I made not just one but two trips across the Northwest. The first was in June, to Casper Wyoming for the Northwest Outdoor Sectional and return via Spokane for the WSAA Field Championships. The second trip, in July, extended all the way to Minnesota, to visit family, and return through Yankton South Dakota for the NFAA Outdoor National Archery Championships.



Along the way, I saw an incredible number and variety of game and non-game animals. These included a herd of elk, three species of deer (black-tail, mule deer, and white-tail), and many, many antelope. Several sightings of pronghorns consisted of does with their twin fawns! I also saw turkeys and quail (on Evergreen Archers' range in Spokane), cottontail rabbits and doves (at campgrounds in Montana and South Dakota), prairie dogs across Montana and Wyoming. These small game animals were opposed by their predators – coyotes, hawks, eagles, and owls. There were also plenty of ducks and geese, swans, and various marsh birds. The other non-game animals included song birds, reptiles and amphibians.

Supporting the abundance of animal life was a variety of vegetation and habitat features: wetlands; forests; grasslands; and cultivated croplands.

In all this experience, I was reminded of the role of America's hunters, fishermen, wildlife viewing enthusiasts, and all kinds of outdoor sportsmen in preserving these resources for the current and future generations. We work to ensure the habitat is maintained and use of the animals and plants are controlled or managed to provide the balance between them.
