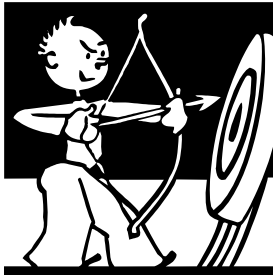

## WASHINGTON GAMES WRAP-UP

The 2008 Washington Games came to an end on August 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2008. 23 events were represented ranging for mainstream sports like basketball and baseball to extreme sports like BMX and in-line skating. Venues all across Puget Sound were utilized, with events being held on the Olympic Peninsula down to Sumner and as far north as Mountlake Terrace and Everett. It is estimated that over 6,500 participants took part in this year's Games. In addition, thousands more participated as sponsors, spectators, volunteers, and event commissioners.

## Become A Certified Witness For Our Resources

Several hundred wildlife supporters are trained by Enforcement Officers on how to effectively report fish and wildlife crimes. The role of Eyes in the Woods will be similar to that of Neighborhood Watch. Our role as officers will be to train the Eyes in the Woods volunteers in how to become an effective, non-confrontational witness, and how to use the most efficient channels for the reporting of fish and wildlife crimes. We will then use that information to investigate and prosecute those crimes.

The EIW - CORT program will do several things for WDFW and the public. The most important items are:

1. Provide a cache of trained volunteers willing to testify on witnessed fish and wildlife crimes, vandalism on private property, or other related crimes.
2. Provide private landowners more security for their property and equipment. This will help to ensure access to property for outdoor recreation.
3. Act as a deterrent to potential violators.
4. Mentoring and information sources in the field.
5. Build support for Enforcement and the Agency.

Officers will provide training to organizations, or groups of individuals, on how to become a non-confrontational, effective witness.

Your cooperation and participation in this program is most appreciated.

## Property Watch/Land Access Program

You Can Make A Difference By Volunteering Now and:

- Helping to keep the woods clean (Pick up trash, don't leave it).
- Respecting private property (Gates, Equipment and the Environment).
- Reporting vandalism and violations (Non-Confrontationally).
- Respect all signage and informational postings.
- Always Think and Act Safety!

This pilot program targets WDFW Regions 5 & 6 focusing in SW Washington. Eyes in the Woods (EIW) Directors are collaborating with multiple local conservation / sport organizations, business owners, private landowners, timber companies, WDFW staff and the media with the goal of opening private lands for outdoor recreational uses, primarily hunting & fishing.

Participating conservation / sport organization members in the pilot area(s) are attending the EIW-WDFW Crime Observation and Reporting Training (CORT) classes. The goal is to increase involvement of local trained volunteers protecting fish, wildlife, habitat and landowner holdings through "CORT" education and capabilities resulting in improved WDFW regulation compliance while assisting private landowners that allow recreational access.

Organizations, sponsors, and EIW Volunteers will help fund and install signage materials supplied by EIW to be placed at strategic access locations (i.e. road entrances, main line logging roads, and private property boundaries, etc.) to act as a deterrent for poaching, dumping, vandalism and other crimes. The signage will announce local stakeholders support for the Property Watch Program increasing public continuity and awareness. EIW Property Watch volunteers will assist in access gate management, the posting and maintaining of signage, and land cleanup projects where access is opened.

Conservation organizations / Sport Clubs involved will identify a program Coordinator for the "Land Access Program" and encourage their membership involvement with the CORT program and assisting with program needs. Participating clubs will host at least one CORT class; promoting ethics, anti-litter and the respect for regulations and private property. Participating clubs will pursue funding / sponsorship for signage materials and assist in the recruitment and organization of volunteer activities (i.e. safety training, posting signage, monitoring gates/roads and campsites, clean up events, etc.) and will complete the WDFW volunteer forms required

The EIW Property Watch/Land Access Program's goal is to include participation of any interested user groups or clubs. EIW paid membership is not required for program participation.



# NFAA Big Game and Small Game Awards

The September issue of The Quiver included information and application forms for the WSAA Big Game Awards. For our members who belong to the National Field Archery Association (NFAA), there is an additional awards program.

The game awards of the NFAA are known as the Art Young Awards. There is a big game program and a small game program. Under each program the first level is an attractive arrowhead pin. Impressive embroidered patches are also available to commemorate your hunting achievements. Big Game patches are full color with gold colored border; small game patches are black on white. Both programs are quite extensive and prestigious among the bowhunting fraternity. The first level of award under the Art Young Big Game program is the Bowhunter. From there you progress to Expert Bowhunter, Master Bowhunter and Grandmaster. Applications for awards are made through NFAA headquarters and must be properly documented. If you are a hunter, check these programs out, once you get involved you'll want to move up the ladder, you might even win the coveted Diamond Buck Award for the largest typical or non-typical mule deer, whitetail deer or blacktail deer based on Pope and Young antler measurements that are awarded annually. For an application and list of species, see our documents section.



In addition to the Art Young Big Game pin for North American Big Game, a similar Art Young Big Game pin is awarded for exotic species taken with the bow and arrow according to NFAA rules. Each species within a group receives an Art Young Game patch, which can be obtained by sending in the Big Game application form and appropriate fee to NFAA headquarters.

**ELIGIBILITY:** Eligibility for the Art Young Award is limited to members of the NFAA at the time taken. There shall be no geographical restrictions, either as to the residence of the claimant, or to the location in which the game is secured.

**AWARDS:** Art Young Big Game Pin and a NFAA Big Game Patch shall be given for the first example of each species taken with the bow & arrow according to NFAA rules, for a processing fee.

**NFAA FAIR CHASE RULES:** Any animal taken under any of the following circumstances should not be considered for an NFAA Art Young Big Game Award: "Yarded" in deep snow; helpless in water; helpless on ice; helpless in trap, while confined behind fences, as on a game farm, etc., in defiance with game laws or out of season; "Jack Lighting" or shining at night; from power vehicle or power boat; any other method considered by the NFAA Bowhunting Committee as unsportsmanlike.

**SUB-SPECIE:** Allow sub-specie of deer including Whitetail, Mule, Blacktail, Sitka, Coues, and Fallow as different big game animals.

**APPLICATION MUST BE PRESENTED WITHIN (1) ONE YEAR OF TAKING BIG GAME AND ACCOMPANIED BY \$5.00 PROCESSING FEE FOR EACH APPLICATION.**

## PAST PRESIDENT: Linda Parker

I haven't been very active as Past President, but I'd like to use this time and space to address one of my pet peeves in archery. Actually, they are three inter-related topics!

About every Club or Shop has a "found arrow bucket". This might take several different forms, from a literal bucket placed near the practice range to a locked bin at the clubhouse. At some point, newcomers to our sport (and even those who have been around for a while) need to be educated or reminded of the purpose of this receptacle. This is a place for archers to place arrows they find on the range – and the place where those of us who sometimes lose arrows hope to be able to reclaim them some day. It is NOT a grab bag for archers to get free arrows that are "almost my size" or "I'd like to try and see how they shoot in my bow". Maybe it is a good idea to label found arrows with the date they are recovered, and make them available one year plus a month after that date? Do your part to help spread the word, and be sure to be part of the solution and not the problem.

Another side of this is what we do on the range when we miss a target and DO find our own arrow, but it is bent or broken. Some archers carry them to the clubhouse to put in the trash, or even take them home, but a few just toss the arrow (or broken nocks or torn vanes) aside on the course. Each item might not seem like much, but on a well-used course this can add up to a lot of litter over time. And what do others do when they find your arrow or parts on the range? They might take it home to cut shorter for the kids or to fix and use for themselves. Worst case, your arrow might end up in the wrong hands and appear in the wrong place. You don't want to see your arrow on the six o'clock news!

The third aspect concerns beverage containers, food wrappers, and miscellaneous trash. I like to believe archers are concerned for conservation and the environment. But often, the archer who carried that soda or candy bar out on the course will leave the empty can or package in the woods. You carried it out full with no problem, surely it weighs much less empty! So maybe you have your hands full of tired kids and their equipment in addition to your own ... If you place the trash near the shooting stake, the bow rack, or the target, we can pick it up in the range maintenance process. If it is tossed out in the brush where it is temporarily out of sight, it all shows up about February when there are no leaves on the berry bushes, but now it is slimy and nasty, and people would have to fight the thorns to retrieve it.

Enough grousing on the keyboard for now ... maybe it is a good time to look for the other kind of grouse! Good luck in the woods or have fun on the range! See you at Convention!

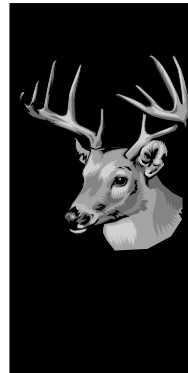

## **WORLD FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP: Three for USA, Two for Italy, One for Germany!**

Llwynypia - 6 September 2008

**The USA took home three of the elite gold medals at the Field Archery World Championships in Llwynypia, while Italy won two titles. Finally, Sebastian Rohrberg of Germany recaptured the title he earned in 2004.**

The final matches of the Field Archery World Championships took place in the beautiful St Fagans National History Museum of Wales. The athletes shot semi-finals on four targets (total 12 arrows at maximum 6 points) and then matches for bronze and gold on four other targets.

### **Recurve Men**

Sebastian Rohrberg of Germany is the new men's world field archery men's recurve champion. Rohrberg, who was also silver medalist in Gothenburg two years ago, took gold this year, as he defeated fellow German Andreas Heuwing by 58 points to 53 in the final.

Japan's Yuki Sakaeyama took the bronze medal. Sakaeyama, who lost to Heuwing in the semis, defeated Vic Wunderle of the United States in the third place play-off.

### **Recurve Women**

In the women's recurve final, Tomasi (Italy) maintained the good form she has shown throughout the week in South Wales. After topping the standings in both qualification days, she top scored again in the eliminations on Friday, and duly took the gold medal. She beat Belgium's Marina Prelipcean in the semi-finals, and then saw off Sweden's Elin Kattstrom in the final, by 51 points to 49.

Germany's Lisa Unruh, who lost out to Kattstrom in the semis, took the bronze medal with a 53-48 victory over Prelipcean.

### **Compound Men**

In the men's compound championship, Rod Menzer (USA) defeated Stephane Dardenne of France by 67 points to 63 in the final, having beaten Denmark's Niels Baldur in the semis.

Dardenne prevented an all-American final when he defeated Dave Cousins in his semi-final. Cousins then bounced back to take the bronze medal, with a 65-63 victory over Baldur.

### **Compound Women**

Jamie Van Natta of the United States won the women's compound gold medal. Van Natta, who lined up alongside Britain's Nichola Simpson, Ivana Buden of Croatia, and Amendine Bouillot of France in Lausanne on September 27, defeated Sweden's Ulrika Sjowall in the gold medal match. That's her first individual world title! Two years ago in Gothenburg, Van Natta won the bronze.

The women's bronze this time went to Anne Laurila of Finland. Laurilla, who lost to Sjowall in the semis, defeated Inge Enthoven of the Netherlands in the third place shoot-off.

### **Barebow Men**

Italy's Sergio Massimo Cassiani is the barebow gold medalist. Cassiani won the men's title with victory by 56 points to 48 over Ladislav Voboril of Germany in the final. Earlier he defeated Mikael Olsson of Sweden in the semi-finals, while Voboril defeated another Swede, Mathias Larsson, who had qualified for the semi-finals in top place.

Larsson won the all-Swedish bronze medal shoot-off, beating his team-mate Olsson by 55 points to 53.

### **Barebow Women**

In the women's barebow, Nelson-Harris (United States) defeated defending champion Luciana Pennacchi of Italy in the semi-finals, and then went on to beat Sweden's Annika Ahlund for the gold medal.

Pennacchi missed out on a medal of any kind this time - she lost the bronze medal match to Manja Conrad of Germany.

### **Official Junior Categories**

In Recurve Junior Men Massimiliano Mandia (ITA) took gold beating Yuan Youja (CHN) with the superb score of 65. Christopher Wells (GBR) earned bronze.

In Recurve Junior Women Ana Umer (SLO) won gold over another Chinese archer, Jiang Hui. Stefania Rolle (ITA) got bronze.

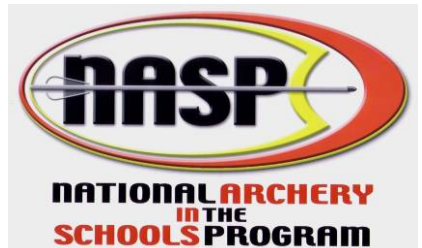
