WSAA Target Championship

Skookum Archers in Puyallup were host for the 2009 WSAA Target Championship conducted 11-12 July. This event consists of two NFAA "900" rounds, one on Saturday and the other Sunday. Each round involves shooting a total of 90 arrows; 30 at each of three distances. For Adult, Young Adult, Senior and Master divisions, these distances are 60, 50, and 40 yards. Youth, Cub, and PeeWee archers shoot at shorter ranges. The five-color 122 cm diameter target is used for all distances and ages. The name of the round reflects the maximum possible points of 900, and this year several archers came quite close to that number!

The "Target" shoot format has some interesting advantages, one being that half the participants are on the shooting at the same time, while the second line waits their turn to shoot. All are within sight of each other, and we can check out other archers' equipment options and shooting form, and trade a few stories with each other. It turns out to be more of a social event than the usual 3-D or Field events, where we primarily interact with only the other two-four people in our shooting group. The other advantage is the ability to provide a lot of creature comfort, with awnings for shade or shelter from rain, stools to sit on between ends, and handy coolers for beverages and snacks.

Saturday was HOT, with only a little variable wind to hamper our shooting. The event got off to a slow start, but moved along pretty well, with the days shooting wrapped up a little after 3 PM. That was followed by our quarterly WSAA Board meeting and an additional meeting for the Tournament Committee, making a long and tiring day for some of us. Only three rigs took advantage of Skookum's grassy camping areas – it was almost too quiet after the shooters left for the night. Sunday weather was dramatically different, starting out foggy and turning to dense clouds and some rain.

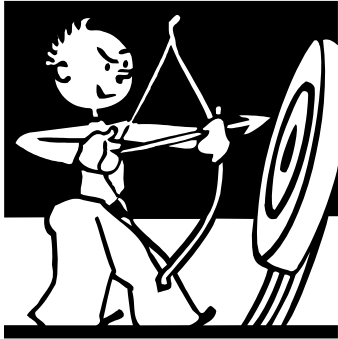

Went to Puyallup this past weekend to the WSAA Target Championship, had a very good time and met old friends again. Do you get the social part of Archery? It is a very big part of why I participate; my scores certainly aren't the big attraction. A very good job by Skookum to make the shoot work and run smooth, thank you so much.

The Board meeting was sparsely attended again but we did have a quorum and were able to take some action on several items. Two big issues were discussed, first of all Tim Davis has resigned for personal reasons as Tournament Vice President, so we have a very large hole in our Board of Directors. Judging by the outpouring of kind words for the job Tim and crew has done it is obvious that Tim will be sorely missed.

The second big issue was the WSAA FITA Championship. WCW, the host club, has registered the shoot as a Star FITA with NAA, as a result a Star level shoot does not allow another tournament to run together with it (WSAA FITA Championship) or allow NFAA Divisions and Styles to be recognized, both of these items runs smack into WSAA Tournament rules. The Board discussed the issue and moved to cancel the WSAA FITA Championship. Please read the revised flier in this issue for the details about the Star FITA that WCW is hosting on the original tournament date.

Most important - it will not be a WSAA Championship. The tournament committee will be working to correct the problems associated with providing NAA type shooting opportunities by WSAA. If this is important to you, get off your tail and become part of the solution. Please do not sit on the sidelines and snipe at those who have given so much daily to bring all of the outstanding Archery opportunities to you.

Okay on to the Convention for 2009...each Club is responsible to provide Vicki with an accurate accounting of WSAA members in your Club; your Club's voting strength is dictated by how many WSAA members you have. All of this must be done by August 1st prior to the Convention. In the month of August the Club and Shop Convention packets will be mailed, in these packets will be a form to list your Club or Shop's tournaments you are holding in 2010 and if you wish them to be placed on the WSAA calendar. Also a bid form if you would like to host a WSAA Championship.

If you are bidding on a Championship please be responsible and attend the Convention and present your request personally. Don't just mail it in and expect someone else to do it, I personally will have a hard time giving your request much if any time.

Our next Board meeting will be at the Convention in Vancouver in October; Archery World is our host this year and has been working on the plans since last October. Start making plans to get your delegates ready to attend.

WSAA Field Championship

Silver Arrow Bowmen of Mount Vernon were hosts for this year's WSAA Field Championship on June 27-28. This is the first time in many years that the Club has held a field tournament on their range; a great deal of effort went into preparation for the event, with newly painted stakes, lots of directional signs, and some trail improvements. All the good work resulted in a well-prepared course and an enjoyable shoot. We had a good turn-out with 75 archers participating – several competing in their first field event. Some fine scores were achieved, and some records set or broken. The Adult Female Bowhunter Freestyle category was closely contested, with Lorrie Starkweather and Christina Davis ending up in a tie for first place, the shoot-off resulted in favor of Lorrie. Scores are reported on page 6.

The "Field Championship" is comprised of three rounds – the Field, Animal, and Hunter. Saturday starts out with 28 field targets followed by 14 animal targets, and then 28 hunter targets on Sunday. The field and hunter rounds require that four arrows be shot at each target, so 4 x 28 = 112 arrows are shot. The animal round is a little different, as an archer shoots one, two, or three arrows at each target – you can quit shooting as soon as you get a hit on the animal. A nice goal is to get through the 14 targets shooting just 14 arrows, but each miss requires another shot! So Saturday is a real long day, Sunday a little shorter to get the awards presentation.

Adding to the challenge, Silver Arrow Bowmen's course includes a lot of difficult terrain, with hills to climb, uneven footing at the shooting positions, and lots of up- and down-hill shots. The weather was almost ideal, starting a little cool in the morning, but quickly warming up to t-shirt temperatures. The skies stayed clear, and we appreciated the shade of the big timber. The club had water and snacks available on the range and at the clubhouse, and also cooked burgers and hot-dogs for lunch, so we were well taken care of.

HUNTING COMMUNITY NEWS

Bowhunter Education: Annette Crews

What should you know about how to stop the bleeding from a bad cut or wound? What three or four pieces of clothing or accessory items could you use to give yourself or another first aid? Can you name two things that you could do to prevent hypothermia? These seem like simple questions, but in a life and death situation they may not be so simple to remember. Discussing them among your hunting partners could save a life!

We work with blades and broadheads almost every day when we're hunting, late season, early season, before the season to prepare our gear. **MOST IMPORTANT:** Control bleeding by applying pressure over the bleeding site. **DON'T PANIC!** Stay still for a few seconds and give it time to clot. Call for help; don't be embarrassed to be a survivor!

The best equipment you have to survive is **your HEAD**. Think about the belt you're wearing or the shirt to make a sling. Use your headnet to apply pressure on a wound if necessary. Use boot laces to make a splint. Don't Panic!

HYPOTHERMIA! The very word demands attention. No one is IMMUNE to it. What is it? The lowering of the temperature in your body's inner core or vital organs. It IS a silent killer that can strike without warning! Wind and water are two factors that increase your chances of becoming hypothermic. Sounds like typical Washington! Many cases occur in temperatures of 40 to 50 degrees. So dress for the weather. Let someone know where you're going. Carry basic survival equipment. If you do get wet and cold to the point of shivering STOP AND BUILD A FIRE. It may save your life! Keep your muscles moving to produce body heat. **DON'T PANIC!**

In our Bowhunter Education classes we teach a more complete survival session. With everyone involved new ideas and situations are discussed in detail. It prepares us all for what it might take to SURVIVE.

We have just three classes lined up for the rest of the year. Our schedules are set in November for the following year. Please call us if your Club or Shop would like to host a weekend of Bowhunter Education!

Congress Introduces Legislation to Protect Hunting on Federal Lands

Hunting's Importance Reaffirmed

(Columbus)-Companion bills, introduced yesterday in Congress, protect the rights of sportsmen to hunt on federal land while also recognizing hunting's importance to all conservation.

The Hunting Heritage Protection Act is made up of Senate bill 1348, sponsored by Senator Saxby Chambliss (R- GA) and H.R. 3046, sponsored by Representative Denny Rehberg (R-MT).

Both pieces of legislation require that federal land be managed in a way that supports, promotes, and enhances access for hunting and mandates that an annual report be submitted to Congress detailing any limitations that are imposed on hunting federal lands. It also will require a written notification be given to Congress prior to any agency action that limits hunting on large parcels of federal land consisting of 5,000 or more acres.

"Sportsmen across America owe Senator Chambliss, Representative Rehberg, and other member of Congress many thanks for the steps they are taking to preserve our hunting rights," stated USSA President and CEO Bud Pidgeon. "In a time where access to suitable hunting land is becoming increasingly difficult, this legislation goes a long way towards curtailing that trend and guaranteeing current or increased hunting opportunities are available today and tomorrow."

Sportsmen should contact their Congressional elected officials and ask them to support the Hunting Heritage Protection Act. Inform them that hunters and other sportsmen and sportswomen are great stewards of federal lands and should have full access to those lands whenever and wherever possible. To find your Congressional officials, go to the Legislative Action Center.

New Recreational Licensing Fees Will Support Hunting Opportunities

OLYMPIA—Washington fishers and hunters will soon see several changes in recreational license fees, approved by the 2009 Legislature to help maintain state fishing and hunting opportunities.

Those changes, which include a temporary surcharge on fishing and hunting licenses, will help offset a \$30 million cutback in state funding for the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), said Joe Stohr, the department's deputy director.

"While looking for ways to balance the budget, state lawmakers recognized that maintaining fishing and hunting opportunities costs money," Stohr said. "They also recognize that those activities are an important part of our state's economy."

In all, the new fees approved by the Legislature are expected to raise \$11 million for fish and wildlife management over the next two years, Stohr said. Those revenues will help WDFW meet key management responsibilities, such as monitoring fish and wildlife populations, collecting harvest data and enforcing fish and wildlife laws



Changes in license fees include:

- **Two-year surcharge:** A temporary, 10 percent surcharge on sales of recreational licenses, permits, tags, stamps and raffle tickets. The surcharge takes effect July 26, and will be in place until June 30, 2011. Authorized by House Bill 1778, it is the first across-the-board recreational license fee increase in more than a decade.
- **Pheasant permits:** A fee increase for western Washington pheasant hunting permits, beginning July 26. Adopted under House Bill 1778 to maintain pheasant production for westside release sites, the increase will raise permit fees to \$35 for youth, \$75 for resident adults and \$150 for non-resident adults. A separate small game license will no longer be required to hunt pheasants in Western Washington, but it will still be required to hunt other small game species such as waterfowl and quail. License requirements and permits for hunting pheasants in eastern Washington are not affected by this initiative.

Stohr noted that none of the new fees are reflected in this year's fishing or big-game hunting pamphlets, which were printed before the Legislature took action. All of the licenses and permits will also be subject to existing dealers' fees and transaction fees, which help offset the cost of the permitting process.

Production of The Quiver continues smoothly.

A couple recent changes – probably related to the economic situation. Our printers – L&L Printing in Puyallup – used to be generous in their “overrun” copies. Also, the mailing service (CMS Mailing, now Databar) used to send these extra copies to me at no charge. Often this meant quite a box full of Quivers which were available to be handed out at sports shows and similar events. NOW, the print run is almost exactly what I ask for, AND the mailing service charges to have the extras sent to me. So we will have to carefully consider if these handouts have value, ask for extras to be printed, and bear the cost of creating and receiving them.

Advertising is doing well, with \$2600 in income already this year. And ALL of the ads have been paid for currently.

Each ad which appears in The Quiver is also posted on the WSAA Website in the “Upcoming Events” section as a stand-alone document. This is another potential area for change. I have been sending the ads to our Webmaster Ray Crisp as Publisher or Word documents, which he converts to Portable Document Format (.pdf) files and places in the Upcoming Events section. Ray has suggested that it would be good for me to do the translation myself.

Ray has made another change to the WSAA Website (www.WashingtonArchery.org). We now have a Calendar of Events with a graphic-type monthly layout. It is in the Forum section of the website. To access the Calendar, from the WSAA Home Page click the link for WSAA Forum, then click on the link at the top of that page for “Calendar”. You can view the current month, then navigate to any subsequent month. The events on any date will be listed, and clicking an event takes you details on the event.

The method to add an event to the Calendar involves going into the Tournament section of the Forum, and create a New Topic. Fill in the Event Title in the Subject line, the Start Date and (if a multiple day event) the End Date, then fill in details of the event such as location, times, fees, targets etc. You can also embed a document such as the tournament flyer, or add a link to your club or shop website for more information. I have added all the July events and most of the August events. In the future, I will put in the State Championship events and rely on the Clubs and Shops to add their own.

Remember that each issue of The Quiver is posted on the WSAA Website. It is usually available there several days before your copy could arrive in the mail, AND the photos and ads are in COLOR. Anyone who would like to stop postal delivery, just send me an email to wsaa@olynet.com.

THANKS to the Clubs and Shops which send news and reports for The Quiver. More input is always welcome.

I would like to have a couple Clubs and Shops each month “Spotlight” to showcase their facilities and activities. All it takes is a few words and photos.

During this quarter, in addition to putting together your newsletter, I have been involved in some “outreach” activities. I helped Dave Mack, Sherrie Crisp, and some folks from Capitol City Bowmen and Lewis and Clark Bowmen present archery at a “Go Play Outside” event at the Thurston County Fairgrounds. I also got together with Sherrie to setup and operate a booth at the Cabela’s Store in Lacey to present archery background material to Scouts contemplating the Archery Merit Badge. In addition to working with the Scouts, we talked to a lot of folks about archery ranges and shops and passed out some printed material. We have another upcoming event – a Scout Jamboree at Fort Lewis on 20-23 August. I committed myself to attend this event, but I’ll need some help. If you can be there for one or both days (21 and 22 August), call or send an email! I have also been selected as the Archery Community representative on the Firearms and Archery Range Recreation (FARR) board of the Washington Recreation and Conservation Office. This committee, provides guidance to staff and project applicants and reviews requests for grant funding.
