WSAA Indoor Multi-Color Championship

The first Championship Tournament of 2009 was held at four locations around the state: Silver Arrow Bowmen in Mount Vernon, AS&J Archery in Yakima, Archery World in Vancouver, and Evergreen Archers / Spokane Valley Archery in Vancouver. With the extreme weather and road conditions encountered during the first week of January, this expansion from the usual three sites was a good decision. This event drew a total of 171 archers, with the largest number participating at Silver Arrow Bowmen, and the overall turn-out distributed as below:

Some excellent scores were achieved, including Pro Male Freestyle John Heuvel with a $300 + 297 = 597$. There was close rivalry in the Adult Male Freestyle division, with only a two-point spread in the top five shooters – Justin Schindler came out on top with 596. Both the A-M-FS and A-M-BHFS divisions were large enough to be split into two flights. Matt Schmitz led the pin shooters with a new record score of 598 and 41 X's. Several other records were broken including Jeff Anderson setting a blazing 290 / 289 in Adult Male Freestyle Limited Recurve.

The young folks really turned out for this one, and 52 of the field were Young Adult, Youth, Cub NASP or PeeWee! We saw three in the PW and one in the NASP division and EACH set new records for their category. On the other end of the age spectrum, 30 archers competed as Seniors or Master Seniors. We also had good representation on the female side, with 21 Adult / Senior / Master Senior women and 19 junior girls.

Several folks joined WSAA to participate in this event - welcome to all of you!

With the Multi-Color events behind us, this month starts the Blueface Mail-In – and the Indoor Blueface Championship will wrap-up the month on 28 February – 1 March 2009. Registration form is in this issue of The Quiver, so sign up NOW!

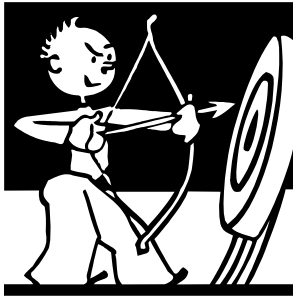

WASHINGTON STATE NAA DIRECTOR: Timm Hines

The NAA has made changes to the format of the Coaching levels within their program. The old system of Level 1, 2, 3, and 4 no longer apply. The new classifications are as follows:

BASIC INSTRUCTOR

Audience: Camp instructors, Girl/Boy Scouts, 4-H etc.

Purpose: Introduce how to teach archery to a new instructor, most likely never shot before. Course focuses on safety, range set-up, basic equipment setup and repair and teaching the basic steps of shooting.

Length of Course: 8-12 hours

Prerequisite: Background check

Administration: NADA

Course Cost: \$20.00 for materials, class fee varies depending on instructor

Renewal period: Three years

Recertification Fee: \$15.00

Recertification Requirement: TBD

INTERMEDIATE INSTRUCTOR

Audience: Instructors with little or no archery experience who will be working in a more established archery program i.e. JOAD, ASAP, Parks/Recreation, College Archery Program (CAP)

Purpose: Introduce basic shooting steps, safety, range set-up; equipment setup and repair, fitting equipment to an archer, how to teach archery and how to teach a Basic Instructor Course.

Length of Course: 16-20 hours

Prerequisite: Background check

Administration: NADA

Course Cost: \$25.00 for materials, class fee set by instructor

Renewal period: Four years

Recertification Fee: \$20.00

Recertification Requirement: TBD

COMMUNITY COACH

Audience: Instructors looking to advance into a coaching and athlete development role.

Purpose: Introduce coaching philosophy, training cycles/plans, competition preparation, mental aspects, equipment, B.E.S.T. training.

Length of Course: 20-24 hours

Prerequisite:

- Background check
- Must have been an Intermediate Instructor for one year – or Pass an exam to ‘test out’ of the Intermediate level and verify three years experience in an archery instructor capacity.

Administration: NADA

Course Cost: \$250.00/per person and includes materials

Renewal period: One year

Recertification Fee: \$25.00

Recertification Requirement:

Attend one Recertification Seminar within a two year period.

REGIONAL COACH

Audience: Coaches looking to advance their coaching skills and become eligible for USA Archery national camps and team appointed positions.

Purpose: Incorporation of sports science, psychology, nutrition, and biomechanics and advanced B.E.S.T. training into coaching philosophy.

Length of Course: One week

Prerequisite:

- Background check
- Must have been a Community Coach for two years

Administration: USA Archery

Course Cost: \$450.00/per person and includes materials

Renewal period: One year

Recertification Fee: \$25.00

Recertification Requirement:

Attend a Recertification Seminar or Junior Dream Team Camp

ELITE COACH

Audience: Coaches looking to advance their coaching skills.

Purpose: To achieve Elite Coach status by demonstrating a strong understanding of the National Training Program, demonstrate effective interaction with athletes and have an established and successful archery program that is producing top athletes.

Length of Course: N/A – Pass evaluation by National Head Coach

Prerequisite:

- Background check
- Regional Coach for two years
- ASEP Course required.
- Choose one of two routes:
Route 1 two Camps -Junior Dream Team Camps (or equivalent); one Camp – Designated Team Leader
Route 2 1-3 month apprenticeship at the OTC-CV with National Head Coach
- Administration:** USA Archery
- Course Cost:** Daily OTC facility charges apply
- Renewal period:** One year
- Recertification Fee:** \$25.00
- Recertification Requirement:** Attend a Recertification Seminar or Junior Dream Team Camp AND must help run a grassroots or Paralympic camp.

MASTER COACH

- Honorary designation recognizing contributions to the sport.
- CDC recommends Master Coach designation.
- To re-enter team selection eligibility pool
- Must complete at a minimum the Regional Coach requirements.
- Recommended they complete Elite Coach requirements.

Orientation Meetings for Master Hunter Applicants Offered In Yakima, Spokane and Olympia



OLYMPIA - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and its Master Hunter Advisory Group are offering orientation classes in February for those interested in enrolling in the 2009 Master Hunter program. The orientation meetings will focus on the Master Hunter program application process, requirements for certification and the role of the master hunter.

Participants may apply for the program after the meetings and will receive packets and study materials to take home, said Mike Kuttel, WDFW Master Hunter policy lead. No pre-registration is required.

The following meetings are open to the public and will be held:

- February 14, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the West Valley Fire Department in Yakima, 10000 Zier Road. Take the Nob Hill Blvd. exit off I-82; turn left onto 72nd Ave. and right onto Zier Road.
- February 21, from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Inland Northwest Wildlife Council headquarters in Spokane, 6116 North Market Street.
- February 28, from 1 to 4 p.m. in Room 172 of the Natural Resources Building (NRB) in Olympia, 1111 Washington Street, off Capitol Way. Directional signs are posted in NRB parking lots.

The Master Hunter program is a voluntary program sponsored by WDFW. Formerly known as the Advanced Hunter Education program, the new Master Hunter program has been redesigned to promote the highest standard of hunter ethics and help ensure continued hunting opportunity in the future. Master hunters participate in controlled hunts to eliminate problem animals that damage property and/or threaten public safety. In addition to providing certification, the program emphasizes safe, ethical, responsible, and lawful hunting practices.

Artificial Feeding Not the Best Way to Help Wildlife

OLYMPIA – Despite record snowfall in some parts of the state, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) biologists say most deer, elk and other wildlife can survive the winter without food provided by humans.

“We know the sight of hungry-looking deer in deep snow can be distressing,” said Dave Brittell, WDFW assistant director for wildlife management. “Some people feel compelled to feed them, but artificial feeding can actually do more harm than good.”

For one thing, feeding can draw animals into areas near roads, leading to collisions with vehicles, Brittell said. It also concerns wildlife biologists because feeding concentrates animals, making them more vulnerable to disease, predators and poaching.

Wildlife managers recognize the popularity of backyard bird feeding, but that, too, can spread disease if feeding stations are not kept clean, Brittell said.

“Feeding is generally unnecessary for most bird populations, but it does allow for close-up viewing,” he said. “We recommend that birders who choose to feed keep feeding stations clean to avoid spreading disease.”

Often, the best way to help wild animals in winter is to avoid disturbing them, allowing them to conserve vital energy, Brittell said. Recommended actions include keeping dogs confined and slowing down while traveling in motor vehicles through wildlife habitat.

Brittell said deer in good condition generally can survive the winter on the season’s limited natural food supplies. Moreover, it can take several weeks for a deer’s digestive system to adjust to hay or other artificial feed. If they don’t have enough fat reserves to get through the adjustment period, deer can die even with bellies full of feed they can’t digest.

For this reason, sustaining deer or elk can be an expensive proposition, Brittell said.

“One white-tailed deer can consume three to four pounds of pelleted feed daily, which amounts to almost 500 pounds of feed over four months,” he said. “Once feeding is started, animals come to expect it and may damage nearby landscape plants or agricultural areas if artificial food is discontinued before natural forage plants emerge in the spring.”

Although WDFW discourages individuals from attempting to feed, the department conducts winter elk feeding in a few special circumstances. For example, WDFW feeds elk from December through March at the Oak Creek Wildlife Area in south-central Washington, to prevent damage to nearby private cropland. WDFW also employs winter feeding as a short-term measure in some areas where winter range has been lost to wildfires, drought or other natural changes in the landscape.

“We feed in select cases for specific reasons,” Brittell said, “But it’s neither effective nor desirable to feed wildlife on a broad scale.”

Wildlife biologists acknowledge that extreme and persistent winter conditions will take a toll on some wildlife populations. But that is just a fact of nature, Brittell said.

“Winter has always been the season that keeps wildlife populations in balance with available habitat,” he said. “People can’t change that, and it can create real problems when they try to do so.”

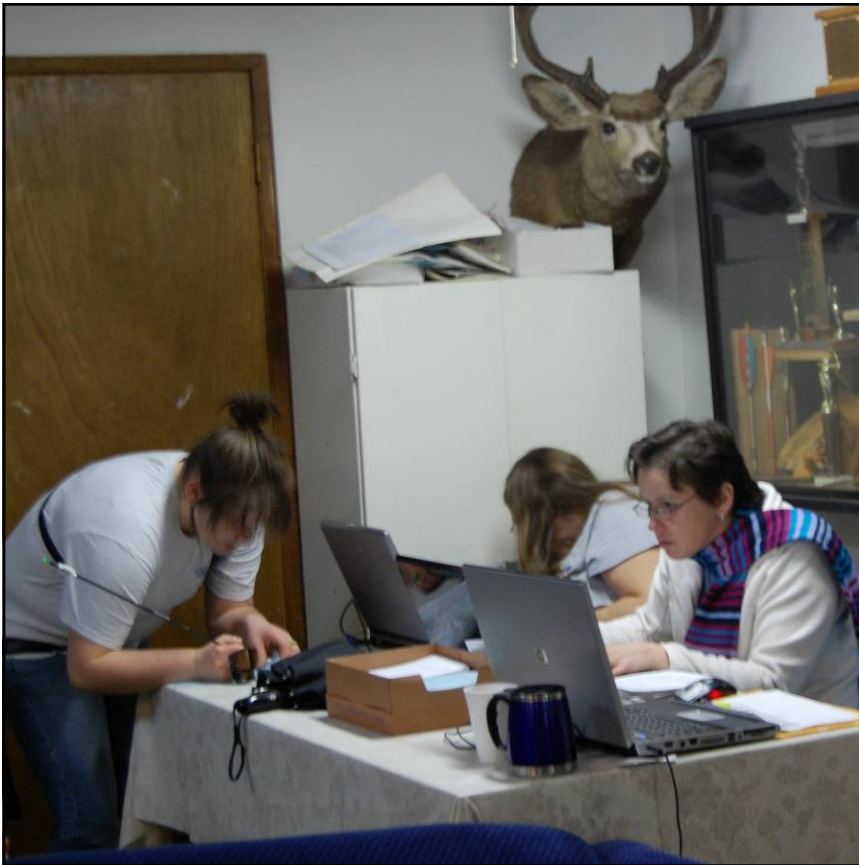
