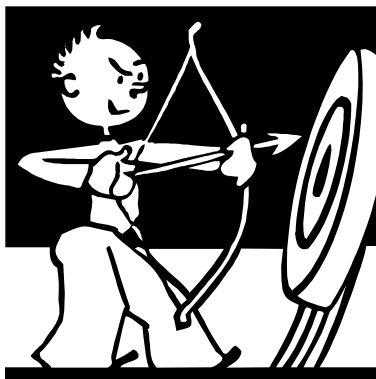

ATTENTION NAA MEMBERS

All NAA members who live in Washington will receive this January and the July issue of The Quiver, the official publication of the Washington State Archery Association (WSAA). WSAA is the NAA-recognized state level organization for Washington.

You are represented on our board by the NAA Director. This position is currently vacant - anyone who is interested in filling this position please contact the WSAA President (see Page 9 for phone number and email address. The NAA Director is an elected position, with two-year term running from 1 April to 31 March in odd years. The NAA Director must be a member of WSAA and a member of NAA.

NAA members who live in Washington are eligible to participate in the Multi-Color Mail-In, the Multi-Color Championship, and the FITA Championship. The Multi-Color Championship is scheduled for 8-10 January, at four locations to minimize winter travel. The registration form is inside this issue. The FITA Championship will be held in August, at Evergreen Archers in Spokane. Also, this year Evergreen Archers are hosting the US Archery Field Championships and Team Trials, scheduled for 4-6 June. We hope you take advantage of these opportunities to shoot and compete close to home.

Our other State Championship tournaments (Indoor Blueface, Target, Safari, Field, and 3-D) require membership in WSAA. These events all include the Freestyle Limited - Recurve shooting style in addition to the various compound categories.

Wildlife Committee of Washington has several FITA Qualifiers and a Star FITA on the Calendar. Several JOAD clubs are also active in the state. We welcome your involvement and efforts to provide the events and programs which support our members' goals and development.

Yes it is true that I have returned as Tournament VP. I have had a lot of people ask me if this is true. I said I would do the position but was going to try to do it differently. I am asking the host clubs of State Championships to take on more of the office work of inputting shooters and assigning targets. I am a shooter just like you all and want to try to shoot to my best ability this year. I shot most of the shoots last year without any warm up shots. I miss being able to shoot the breeze with all of those friends I go to shoot with. So hopefully I can find a way to do both with less stress.

It is time to start thinking of Blue face Mail-ins now. Get your teams together and get them signed up for the tournament. You only need three shooters and can have as many as six. We take the best three scores and use them for the team score for each week. If you have any questions shoot me an email or give me a call and I would be happy to answer any questions.

Let us see how many people we can get in the running for "Archer of the Year Award". This is determined by shooting State Championships. The more you shoot the better your chances are. We take your scores, and compare it to the records in your division to get a decimal value. All the values are then added up and the highest decimal value is the winner. This way anybody is eligible to win this award. You just need to get to as many shoots as possible. I have had many questions of how this is computed.

Division Champions are determined by a total of all points shot at all Championship Tournaments in the specific divisions. They are not based off of the records in the divisions. Whoever has shot the most points in a division is the Division Champion. Hopefully this will help explain it.

I will quit rambling on now. If I can do anything to help anyone please feel free to get a hold of me. I can't wait to see you all at the shoots. Shoot well.

Happy New Year! We hope your holidays were wonderful and you're excited about the opportunities ahead in the New Year for you.

Since NASP revolves around the school year instead of the calendar year, we're already a third of the way through our new year. And it has been exciting! Here's a brief update:

Sherrie Crisp and crew have completed two Basic Archery Instructor (BAI) courses (one in November and one in December 2009). The students at these courses include teachers from Shoreline HS, Wishkah Valley, Oak Harbor MS & ES, McKenna ES, Anacortes HS, Arlington Christian, Kelso HS and archers from KBH, Whidbey Island and Lewis and Clark Bowmen. The next BAI course will be in Lynden on 30 January and preparations are being made for courses in the Vancouver and Tri City areas.

The growth of NASP in Washington is really picking up speed. As you can see from the schools seeking BAI training, we've added a number of schools already this year and some the new schools are very large urban schools. We have past the 50 school threshold and should be well on our way to 100 schools by the beginning of next year.

Classes are coming together for 2010. Some instructors will be checking in as their schedules firm up.

If you're going out of the state for your hunt or even putting in for tags out of the state you'll want to check the regs of that state to see if you need the International Bowhunter Education Certificate to hunt there.

If you have family members new to archery hunting this class will give them a jump start and about ten years of knowledge in just ten to fourteen hours.

Most the classes cost around ten to fifteen dollars, depending on the materials included above the standard booklet. Some clubs that have an instructor travel in donate some gas money to them to help with expenses.

If you're in the giving spirit we have an account set up to buy materials to use in teaching so any donations can be sent in memory of a beloved hunting partner, or acquaintance. All donations are tax deductible and we'll send you a receipt for your kind donation. Any land donated will be used at our discretion for classes or field work. Raging Roosevelts the ASP way

With the onset of new regulations cutting early archery elk season down, fewer public lands to hunt on the west end due to timber company cutbacks, and an overall rise in tag purchases since 1997, one might say that it is getting harder to tag-out on a legal elk in Washington State. With archery success hovering around 9.5%, the odds just seem to beat most hunters down even further. But there are some, like the crew of Angry Spike Productions (ASP), a small group of hardcore, dedicated Roosevelt elk hunters and videographers, who continually beat the odds and tag out season after season. It has become clear, as ASP crew member Shannon Mobbs says, that there is no shortcut to success in the field. Given the crew's track record of videoed kills with archery tackle since 2005, any elk hunter looking to up their elk IQ would fare well to follow their advice.

The rise in hunter numbers—825 archery hunters average per year—has led archery enthusiasts like myself to abandon some old stomping grounds in search of untouched and unpressured elk. So how does one go about finding new area? Shannon's response was, "During modern firearm season is when we do most of our new area scouting. With gates open, we can drive areas and cover larger distances. We look for rubs. The more rubs in an area, the higher the bull population. Our general rule of thumb for distance is about five miles; this makes for at least a ten mile day on the bike."

Once a possible new area is discovered, the fun begins, mainly in the form of scouting. "I may go into a new area several times in late spring or early summer. Mostly to confirm what I found during the late fall scouting trips, or if I am focusing on a big bull and want to confirm he made it through the winter."

Confirmation of a big bull in your new-found area leads to many sleepless nights for most elk hunters, who long for those crisp September mornings enroute to their destinations. For the ASP crew, getting to that destination by bike is the best way, and once there, they begin to locate bulls. Shannon explained, "For the most part we are on mountain bikes, stopping on ridges and just off the creek bottoms or any spot that may hold elk. We will bugle twice to locate. The first bugle is to get their attention. This bugle is just a scream, no chuckles. The second bugle, usually 15 to 60 seconds later, is the full meal deal with chuckles. If the bull is real close or super hot he may respond prior to the second bugle."

This is the situation every elk hunter dreams of, with a screaming bull closing the distance. This is also the situation that gets most hunters in trouble. It's always the same story you hear during the off season, "The bull was coming hard, the wind shifted and he was

A Silver Lining for Sportsmen During Economic Turmoil?

*Hunting and Fishing License Sales Appear to Be Trending Up
Despite Economy*

With the economy facing one of the largest downturns in recent history, it is surprising that participation in hunting and fishing is increasing. According to several recent leading outdoor research firms, these increases may actually be the result of the economic downturn.

A new quarterly report issued by the American Sportfishing Association (ASA), Recreational Boating and Fishing Foundation (RBFF), and Southwick Associates found a 7.7 percent increase in the number of fishing licenses sold between January 1 and September 1, 2009 versus the same time last year.

According to Responsive Management, another leading research firm, hunting numbers also appear to be increasing.

“We won’t know for a few months exactly where we’re at as hunting license sales finish,” said Mark Damian Duda, Responsive Management executive director. “However, it looks as if we’re getting greater hunter participation over the last year too”

This raises the question as to why hunting and fishing numbers are increasing in a time when sportsmen’s resources are stretched thin due to national economic challenges.

The answer may be found in the results of a study conducted in 2008 by Responsive Management for the Georgia Department of Natural Resources. The study, funded by a Hunting Heritage Partnership grant from the National Shooting Sports Foundation (NSSF), looked at increases in hunting license sales in 1992, 1999 and 2004. These license sale increases occurred despite hunting license sales trending down since 1982.

In an effort to understand why the downward trend was lessened in those years, Responsive Management looked at multiple variables such as average monthly temperature, consumer prices, median income, new housing starts, housing, population densities and population by age groups.

Of those variables reviewed, two were considered to be statistically relevant at the national level. Both of these variables negatively impacted hunting numbers. The first was the percentage of the population between the ages of 65 and 69. As sportsmen age, they are less likely to get out into the field. The second is the increase of new housing starts. The reason for this correlation is unclear. However, the results of a 2007 national survey by Responsive Management and the NSSF indicated that a majority of hunters tend to be employed in construction type jobs.

Additionally, two other surveys in 1995 and 2008 indicated that “work obligations” was a leading factor in hunters being unable to enter the field. Combined, these results support the idea that during times when new construction takes off, sportsmen that are most likely to go into the field simply do not have enough time to do so.

Though there is a need for more study to accurately determine the impact of so many different factors, these survey results paint an interesting picture. It appears possible that the time available to sportsmen to engage in the outdoors may increase during economic downturns.

“Certainly, we all want the economy to getting moving again,” said Bud Pidgeon, U.S. Sportsmen’s Alliance president and CEO. “However, if there was ever a silver lining in these otherwise tough times, it might be that we are having the chance to get back in the field.”

Grants Available For Volunteer Projects That Benefit Fish And Wildlife

OLYMPIA – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) began accepting grant applications December 1 2009 from individuals and groups seeking financial support for volunteer projects that benefit fish and wildlife.

The one-year grants will support project activity occurring between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011.

Offered through the Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) Volunteer Cooperative Grant Program, the grants provide cost reimbursement for volunteer-driven projects that protect and enhance fish and wildlife, and their habitats, improve access to the outdoors, collect and disseminate fish and wildlife science, and educate the public about resource conservation. Project types include habitat restoration, research, education and outreach, facility development and artificial production. Other projects may be considered.

“We’re interested in receiving proposals that utilize volunteers, reflect WDFW’s goals and objectives and request funds to cover essential costs needed to conduct the project,” said Josh Nicholas, program coordinator.

Eligible applicants include individual citizens, non-profit organizations, state organizations such as public utility districts and schools (including universities), and tribal governments.

Total funding available is approximately \$180,000.

Applications must be received by February 28, 2010. Application materials are available on WDFW’s website at <http://wdfw.wa.gov/grants/alea/>. A CD containing application materials is available by calling (360) 902-2700.

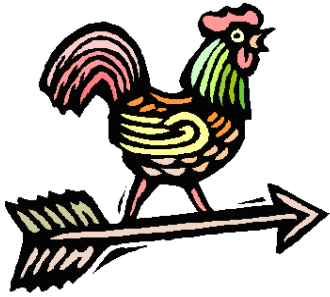

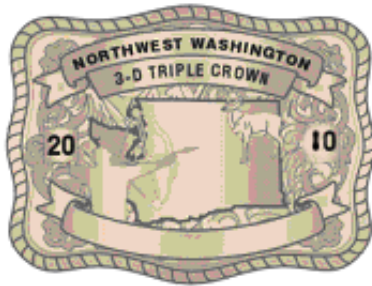

together teachers that are in the program with teachers that are interested in the program. They talk and we are now seeing many of those schools joining the program.

Including NASP in your conversations with anyone that will listen is a great tool for adding more schools to the program. Arlington Christian, Asotin and La Center are schools that will be starting programs because of conversations they had with fellow teachers, friends at ball games and with other programs that promote outdoor recreation and wildlife conservation well away from our immediate contact. So please use your own personal passion as an archer, bow hunter and as a member of Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Safari Club International, National Wild Turkey Foundation, Trout Unlimited ... (you get the picture) to bring up how important it is to all of these wildlife conservation causes to be sure that we keep bringing our young people into the outdoors with us and how NASP is creating a tremendous world wide program to make it much easier to get our young people back outside. La Center MS will be starting NASP this year thanks to one of their teachers having attended the SCI Outdoor Leadership School this past summer. While there SCI provided her with the opportunity to take the NASP BAI course as the introduction to archery. She will be teaching archery for the first time this year and we are setting up a class for three more teachers so that all La Center students will shoot next year. THANK YOU SCI!

We'll be traveling around the state this year sharing NASP with you and explaining more about how to get your schools involved and how to get your clubs and shops prepared to support and benefit from NASP with after school archery. Hope to see you at one of our meetings,

gone!' So how does the ASP crew battle the fickle winds? "We have, over the years, tried just about every scent control product on the market. The bottom line is you cannot trick their nose. If a bull smells you, it's over. So, with that in mind, we do everything possible to keep the wind in our favor, even if it means not hunting that bull on that day."

When you find yourself at the screaming end of a hot bull, your heart racing, and all your hard work having nearly paid off, Shannon says there is one last thing, "I just want to emphasize how important it is to be spot-on with your weapon. Be it a gun, bow or front loader, it all boils down to that one shot. Know the anatomy of your target and make a fatal first shot." He used the example of a recent late-season hunt with his dad saying, "(We) saw three herds, he drew back two different times, (but) just was not 100% confident in the shot." This is the type of ethics everyone must have when the moment of truth come, by not trying to force a bad shot and potentially losing a big bull.

So what are Shannon's top three rules he follows in regard to elk hunting success? Number One: Persistence. Go the extra mile. Number Two: Confidence, saying 'I'm, going to call one in today and make a good shot.' Finally, Number Three: Wind direction. Know it and use it to your advantage.

SHOOTING RULES

1. Equipment Rules: Follow NFAA Equipment Rules.
2. A line captain shall be selected and shall settle all doubtful issues pertaining to shooting and scoring.
3. Each contestant must declare before shooting begins that he/she is shooting for WSAA Mail-in official score. (A contestant may not shoot two or more rounds and then use the best overall scores.)
4. There will be two official practice ends consisting of four minutes each.
5. The round will be shot on the NFAA Blueface target (individual's choice of single-spot or five-spot)
 - a. An end shall be composed of 5 arrows, 4 ends shall be a game.
 - b. There shall be a 4-minute time limit to shoot an end.
 - c. The round shall be composed of 12 ends -3 games.
 - d. The archer will shoot their assigned target. If assigned to an upper target, the archer will shoot the upper target for the first six ends, and then rotate to shoot the lower for the remaining six ends, and vice-versa.
6.
 - a. Scoring area values for the single-spot face shall be 5-4-3-2-1.
 - b. The white line that separates the scoring areas shall be entirely in the higher scoring area.
 - c. If shooting the five-spot face, score the white spot 5, the blue rings 4.
 - d. X rings shall be counted and used as tie breakers, and will be considered part of the official score.
 - e. Archer shall record Xs and numeric value of each arrow on the scorecard.
7. No archer may advance in front of the shooting line during normal shooting periods for ANY reason. Any archer shooting prior to beginning whistle or after whistle signaling end will lose the highest scoring arrow or arrows equaling the number of discrepant arrows shot.
8. In case of equipment failure, verified by the line captain, the archer shall have fifteen minutes to make repairs, without holding up the tournament. Backup bows may be used.
 - a. The archer shall be given one end for the purpose of resighting.
 - b. Make up arrows will be shot at the end of the round in the presence of the Line Captain.
 - c. This occurrence of repair or replacement may not happen more than once in a tournament day.
9. In case of major equipment failure which cannot be repaired in the time allowed, an archer may suspend shooting and continue the round at a later date. Either repaired or replaced equipment may be used.
 - a. Scorecards will be retained by the location reporter until the round is completed.
 - b. Make up round will be shot in the presence of the Line Captain.
 - c. This occurrence of suspending and continuing shooting may not happen more than once in the series.
 - d. This option applies to the Mail-In tournament ONLY.
10. When an arrow is dropped while the archer is in the act of shooting he may shoot another arrow in place of the dropped arrow if any part of the arrow is within ten feet of the shooting line. (A dropped arrow is one which falls while being transferred from the quiver to be nocked on the string, or on preparation for a shot, or which falls from the string during a controlled letdown.)
11. The line captain will make all decisions on scoring questionable arrows, and their decisions are final.
 - a. All scoring shall be completed before an arrow in the target face, or the target face itself, may be touched.
 - b. Witnessed bounce-outs or arrows passing completely through the target butt will be reshot at the end of the round, in the presence of the Line Captain.
 - c. If an archer shoots more than five arrows in an end, only the five arrows of lower value may be scored. A penalty of one point will be assessed for each arrow shot over the prescribed number of arrows.
 - d. Hits on the wrong target will be scored as misses.
 - e. If an archer shoots less than five arrows in one end he may shoot his remaining arrows if the omission is discovered before the end is officially completed, otherwise, they shall be scored as misses.
 - f. If using the five spot target face, an archer may shoot any of the five target spots in any order and shoot as many arrows into any spot as the archer desires, not to exceed the prescribed number of arrows per end.
12. Bowhunter Freestyle and Bowhunter Freestyle Limited competitors may NOT adjust their pin sights after the first arrow has been shot for score.
13. Any registered shooters must complete all six rounds to be eligible for awards for individual or teams.
14. Winner is the archer with the highest total score. In the event of a tie, the individual registering the most X rings shall be declared the winner. If there should still be a tie, the participants shall be declared tied and equal awards shall be given regardless of unit rule. However, other places shall be adjusted to reflect the awards given according to unit rule and unit rule will only be broken to award duplicate awards to the last place allowable by unit rule.
15. Any rules not covered above shall be referred to the Tournament Committee.
16. Any grievances must be presented in writing to the Tournament Committee, and must be accompanied by a \$25.00 fee.
