## WSAA Target Championship 16-17 July at Skookum Archers

We arrived early Friday afternoon, to get our camp spot setup and do a little practice, and other archers started rolling in soon after. It looked like a pretty big gathering by time evening came.

The field had already been set up a week earlier, to host the Washington Games and the State Senior Games on the previous weekend. The range looked in great shape, but the club members roared around on the lawn mowers giving the grass a fresh cut before re-opening the target course for practice.

Friday night and early Saturday morning some HEAVY rains came through, but by 8 AM the threat of showers was gone. The clouds did stay for most of the day, keeping the temperatures cooler than the usual July weather. With last minute registrations, and adjustments to handle the large turnout of archers and setup for the various shorter distances for Youth, Cubs, and PeeWees, we got a LATE start on Saturday. With 78 archers we filled 23 targets and spread across the whole range, with the Pros and Freestyle archers on one end, Cubs and PeeWees on the other.

The 900 round involves shooting three distances (60, 50, and 40 yards for adults, shorter distances for Youth, Cubs, and PeeWees) and 30 arrows at each distance in 6-arrow ends. We shot the first two distances with only a quick break between them, then took a half-hour lunch break before starting the shortest distance. Finishing about 4 PM, it was quite a long day.

Target events have a staid reputation, but a lot of socializing and a little teasing went on among archers on a target and with those in other groups. Unlike the other outdoor events (Field, 3D and Safari), we are all in sight and hearing of each other, not just our own small group. Many participants brought shade (and rain) shelters and chairs, so we could relax and get out of the elements between ends of shooting.

Sunday was a different situation, as the day started with light misty rain, which progressively got harder to quite a steady shower for part of the day. We were adding and removing raingear and sweat shirts to adapt to the changing climate as the day went on. We again got a late start, and delayed events a few times while adjustments were made to swap target butts which were allowing too many arrows to penetrate too deeply or even completely pass through. A big turnout was a good thing, but it didn't leave many spare butts to swap into play when trouble arose. Shooting finished about 3 PM, and the results were tallied to determine winners and present awards before everyone left for home. Some great scores were achieved, and some new records set. Number of Participants = 78

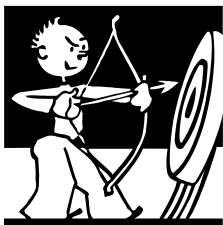

## Women's Workshop Offers Instruction in Fishing, Hunting, and Outdoor Skills

OLYMPIA - Women can learn the basics of fishing, hunting and other outdoor skills in a September weekend workshop that includes several sessions led by Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) experts and other certified instructors.

The annual workshop, scheduled September 16-18 at Camp River Ranch in Carnation, is coordinated by Washington Outdoor Women (WOW), a non-profit program dedicated to teaching women outdoor skills and natural resource stewardship. Now in its 14th year, WOW is an educational outreach program of the Washington Wildlife Federation.

Twenty different classes will be offered throughout the weekend, including archery, basic freshwater fishing, fly fishing and fly tying, kayaking, cooking wild game, big-game hunting basics, wilderness first aid, survival skills, medicinals on the trail, training a hunting dog, outdoor photography and more.

WDFW staff members serving as volunteer instructors for the event include biologists Laura Till and Susan Cierebiej, who will teach the use of a map and compass in the field. In all, 34 instructors will volunteer their time and expertise at the WOW workshop to help women re-connect with the outdoors.

Workshop participants must be at least 18 years old, and those planning to participate in the fishing and fly-fishing sessions must have a current Washington recreational fishing license.

The workshop fee of \$235 includes the weekend's lodging, meals and use of all necessary equipment. Partial scholarships, provided by the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, are available for first-time participants.

## Archery Outreach

WSAA (Dave Mack and Jay St Charles of Gunshy Ridge Archers) had another successful outreach event on Tuesday, 12 July. We set up in the play field behind Sanislo Elementary School in west Seattle and helped two groups of nine students each with their first archery experience.

One of the groups had a large number of very young people - 5 to 7 years old. We really need four or five mini genesis bows for our outreach events.

Jay was a great help. He brought along a bunch of his long bows and flu-flu's. Several of the kids in each group tried the long bows. At the end of the second segment he had the kids take a turn at trying to land a flu-flu arrow into a bucket set about 15 yards from the shooting position. This provided some variety at the end of the session and made for a clean and positive exit from the main shooting.

This event started with a request (in January) by the school to another organization, who forwarded the request to WSAA. After kicking around possible dates and staffing and setup scenarios, Jay volunteered and was VERY helpful with a preliminary site visit and everything finally came together.

## FITA becomes World Archery Federation

The 49th FITA Congress was historical: the Fédération Internationale de Tir à l'Arc (FITA) will be called World Archery Federation (WA) in the future! KIM Soo-Nyung (KOR) and Darell PACE (USA) have been named Athletes of the Century! Archery Tickets for the London 2012 Olympic Games are sold out!

Celebrating the 80th anniversary of FITA, the delegates took some key decisions looking at the future of the organization and bid farewell to two outstanding personalities in the archery community: Honorary President Francesco GNECCHI RUSCONE (ITA) and 1st Vice President Paul PAULSEN (NOR).

Continuing its trend of becoming a modern, internationally recognized and important Olympic sport, the Congress voted at a very large majority (88%) to change the organization name: from FITA to World Archery Federation (WA). This decision allows the sport to align itself with the dynamic World Archery brand that has been launched two years ago and to have a name that will be easily understood worldwide.

The World Archery Federation President Prof Dr Ugur ERDENER said, "I am delighted by the Congress decision and the large support this proposal has received. Let me first reassure you that we are not denying our history. We have a wonderful heritage on which we are building our future. Archery is of course one of the most ancient sports and has played a key role in human society. As a federation we have had a strong development in our 140 member federations. We have had intense competitions and superb events. I would like to sincerely thank all the people who have helped us arriving so far and we just want to make sure that gives our people and our sport the best platform, the best look and the best chance to be known worldwide. We want to be recognized as dynamic, attractive and important Olympic sport!"

The upcoming world championships and Olympic Games until 2016 were given the chance to present their events. London Olympic and Paralympic Games Competition Manager Chris MARSH gave an update on the archery preparation for the 2012 Games. Along the superb venue design he presented for Lords Cricket Ground and the Royal Artillery Barracks for Para Archery, he came with great news: in principle the 63,000 archery tickets for the Games are sold out!

The World Archery Plan 2007-2012, involving people at all level of the archery community and experts outsiders of the sport, has led to the launch of the World Archery brand in 2009. The brand wants to be intense, dynamic and bringing together all the archery activities in the world. Today's renaming of FITA to World Archery Federation is a logical step in the continuation of the plan. The plan will now focus in expansion through the development of the Members Federation, for instance in sharing best practices. A World Archery management seminar will be held in November as the continuation of the plan.

Last but not least, it was fitting to have some celebration at the Congress: the 150 years of Archery GB, the 150 years of the German Archery Federation, the 50 years of the Italian Archery Federation and the 80 years of FITA/World Archery. Each association chose two athletes that they wanted to celebrate as the most iconic archers in a celebration poster: Alison WILLIAMSON and Simon TERRY for Great Britain, Cornelia PFOHL and Franz BAUM for Germany, Paola FANTATO and Giancarlo FERRARI for Italy as well as KIM Soo-Nyung (KOR) and Darrell PACE (USA) for FITA/World Archery.

## Washington Secures Nearly \$1 Million More under Farm Bill for Hunting, Fishing Access

OLYMPIA – More private landowners in eastern Washington will have an incentive to open their lands to fishing and hunting, thanks to a new federal grant of nearly \$1 million to the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW).

The new grant, authorized by the federal Farm Bill, is the second awarded to WDFW in as many years by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Last year, WDFW received \$1.5 million to increase recreational access to private lands around the state.

“Hunters and fishers consistently rank access to the land and water as one of their top concerns,” said Nate Pamplin, assistant director of the WDFW wildlife program. “This new funding will bolster current state efforts to expand recreational opportunities in our state for years to come.”

Don Larsen, WDFW private lands coordinator, said the new \$993,231 grant will be used in three ways:

- Provide incentives to private landowners to allow hunting on forested properties in Kittitas, Klickitat, Pend Oreille, Spokane, Stevens and Yakima counties.
- Work with landowners in Columbia, Garfield, Lincoln, Walla Walla and Whitman counties to improve habitat enrolled in both the federal Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and WDFW access programs.
- Initiate a “Feel Free to Fish” program in southeast Washington, paying private landowners for shoreline access to river fisheries.

Washington was one of 11 states to receive grant funding in this second year of the Farm Bill’s Voluntary Public Access (VPA) and Habitat Incentive Program (HIP), administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

“This federal and state partnership with private landowners creates recreational opportunities for the public that might not exist otherwise,” said Judy Olson, state executive director for the USDA’s Farm Service Agency (FSA), which administers the federal grants. “This access program is one of the ways the Farm Bill benefits more than just farmers.”

Through July 21, the USDA is accepting public comments on its finding that WDFW’s plan for using the \$1.5 million awarded last year would not have a significant effect on the environment. The federal findings, consistent with the National Environmental Policy Act, are posted on the Internet at <http://bit.ly/mpufNQ>, along with information on submitting public comments.

“We look forward to working cooperatively with private landowners to expand fishing, hunting and wildlife-viewing opportunities on private lands,” Pamplin said. “Once we get final approval from USDA, we plan to sign up as many suitable properties as possible in time for the fall hunting season.”

## Discover Pass Now Available

OLYMPIA-The state's new Discover Pass for vehicle access to state parks and recreation lands is available for sale at recreational license dealers and online.

The Discover Pass-providing access to 7 million acres of state park and recreation lands-will generate funding to keep those lands open following steep state budget cuts.

"We are optimistic that people will support state parks and recreation lands and buy the Discover Pass," said Don Hoch, State Parks director. "Without the pass to support State Parks, we would have been closing park gates all over the state."

Beginning July 1, the pass is required for vehicle access to recreation lands and water-access sites managed by the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission, the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW). State recreation lands include state parks, boat launches, heritage sites, wildlife and natural areas, campgrounds, trails and trailheads.

"The Discover Pass will help ensure that the beautiful recreation lands of Washington State remain open for all to enjoy," said Commissioner of Public Land Peter Goldmark. "For less than the cost to take the family out to the movies, we can keep popular places such as Mount Si, Capitol State Forest and Ahtanum State Forest open."

There are several ways to purchase the Discover Pass:

- Online at [www.discoverpass.wa.gov](http://www.discoverpass.wa.gov).
- At nearly 600 sporting goods and other retail stores that sell recreational fishing and hunting licenses. A vendor list is available at <http://wdfw.wa.gov/licensing/vendors/> or via a link from the Discover Pass website.
- By telephone, toll-free at 1 (866) 320-9933.
- At state parks, where staff is available.
- From state Department of Licensing vehicle license agents, beginning this fall.

The annual Discover Pass fee is \$30, and a one-day pass is \$10. A Discover Pass purchased from a recreational license dealer, by phone or online will cost a total of \$35, which includes the \$30 pass fee, a 10 percent transaction fee and \$2 dealer fee. A one-day Discover Pass costs a total of \$11.50, which include the \$10 base price, a 10 percent transaction fee and a 50-cent dealer fee.

"The Discover Pass allows state natural-resource agencies to maintain public access to millions of acres of state recreation lands," said Phil Anderson, WDFW director. "Sport fishers and hunters have traditionally supported WDFW wildlife areas and water access sites through their license fees; now all who enjoy these lands will share in their support."

The Discover Pass must be visible in the front windshield of street-legal motor vehicles on state recreation lands.

Holders of certain types of fishing and hunting licenses, registered campers in state parks and certain others are not required to buy or display a Discover Pass. For details on these and other exemptions, visit [www.discoverpass.wa.gov](http://www.discoverpass.wa.gov).

There is a \$99 penalty for failing to display the pass as required.

On the July Fourth holiday weekend-the first few days of Discover Pass implementation-public education and compliance with the new pass requirement will be emphasized, according to agency officials.

Revenue from the Discover Pass will fill budget gaps created by the loss of state General Fund support for parks and state recreation lands. Revenue from pass sales will be divided among the three state agencies that manage state recreation lands in proportion to General Fund (tax-revenue) reductions: 84 percent to State Parks; 8 percent to WDFW; and 8 percent to DNR.

The Discover Pass was approved by the 2011 Legislature (Senate Bill 5622) and signed in May by Gov. Chris Gregoire. In addition to providing a stable source of revenue, the legislation provides reciprocal authority for law enforcement staff from each agency.

## WDFW Officials Offer The Following Advice If A Bear Is Encountered In The Wild:

- Don't run. Pick up small children, stand tall, wave your arms above your head and shout.
- Do not approach the animal and be sure to leave it an escape route. Try to get upwind of the bear so that it can identify you as a human and leave the area.
- Don't look the bear directly in the eye, as the animal may interpret this as a sign of aggression.
- If the animal does attack, fight back aggressively.

The finals match for youth world competition will reveal top three from junior and cadet, men and women to represent the US in Legnica, Poland next month.

## JOAD Grand National Champions

Following a three-day Easton JOAD Nationals tournament that included a two-day ranking round, team rounds and intense elimination round match play, one archer in each category has emerged as the JOAD Grand National Champion.

Archers were awarded points based on qualification round placement; one point for participation in the team round; and points for final finish in the elimination rounds, creating a total that determined their ranking for the championship title.

In the compound bowman women's category, it's Jordan Locklin who emerges as the Grand National Champion, thanks to a strong first place finish in Sunday's elimination rounds. Cinder Sexton ranks second, while Lindsey Weatherspoon takes third in the overall rankings. For the recurve women, Mikayla Venoms is the top finisher and Champion, thanks to first place finishes in both events. Anushka Hassan follows with a second place ranking, and **Alexa Claps** ends in third.

For the recurve bowman men, Ryan Oliver leads the group, earning the Championship title with a top finish in the eliminations. He is followed by Austin Cha and Jorrin Song. For the compound bowman men, John Klus Jr., taking first in both qualification and eliminations, is the new JOAD Grand National Champion; Tristan Frerich and Spencer Yee take second and third positions in the rankings.

Allie Blazek is the 2011 Champion for the compound cub women, while Prilentka Pengal and Ashley Wilson take the number two and three spots. For the recurve cub women, **Kimie Roop** becomes Champion, followed by Faith Northcutt and Julie Kong.

On the young men's side, recurve archer Jack Thomas shot his way to a first place elimination round finish - and the

Championship title. Just behind him are Jake Ohlendorf and Hunter Conley. Michael DeCosta becomes the Grand National Champion for the compound cub men, topping the qualification and elimination rounds, while Todd Edgar and Kaden Pearce take the second and third place rankings.

Recurve cadets comprised the largest group at this tournament, and competition was intense in the cadet categories. For the recurve cadet women, Mackenzie Brown, winner of the elimination round, becomes Grand National Champion, with Michelle Gilbert and Lauren Clamon ranked just behind. Matthew Zumbo also claims the Championship title, finishing first in both qualification and elimination events, while Christopher Luman and Alex Wifler rank second and third.

For the compound cadet men, Bridger Deaton is Grand National Champion, with Riley Whiting and Danny Button coming in close behind in the second and third positions. On the compound cadet women's side, it was Emily Fischer finishing first for the Championship title, while Paige Pearce and Emily Bee finish second and third.

The compound junior women were also very evenly matched. Kailey Johnston becomes the JOAD Grand National Champion for 2011, followed closely by Carli Cochran and Kendal Nicely. On the recurve side, it's **Shannon Ostling** who will take the Championship title, with Holly Stover and Sarah Bernstein taking second and third place final finishes.

For the recurve junior men, Peter Kelchner, who finished first in both events, claims the title of Champion, while Daniel McLaughlin and Jeremiah Cusick take second and third place rankings; for the compound junior men, Garrett Abernathy emerges as the Grand National Champion, followed by Connor Kelly and Aaron Groce in the second and third spots.

The Easton JOAD National Championships, held in Discovery Park, Sacramento, CA, was host to over 260 archers from across the United States. USA Archery thanks title sponsor Easton for its support of this national event, as well as host club Wilderness JOAD, the State Archers of California, the Sacramento Convention and Visitors' Bureau, the University of California - Berkeley Archery Club, and the organizers of the AAE Arizona Cup, for their assistance.

## GRAYS HARBOR: Rainforest Safari

Beautiful warm sunny weather set the stage for the Rainforest Safari at Grays Harbor Bowmen On 25-26 June. The range was in great shape; we introduced some new target designs and an elevated shooting platform, and attracted about 45 archers, some local and others from as far away as Wenatchee. We had some new guests and several of the regular participants.

Archers shot 35 different targets each day, from distances as close as 4 yards or as far as 92 yards away. Each target has a center spot worth 11 points, a circular area around the spot for 10 points, and a hit in the remainder of the animal earns 8 points. Two arrows shot at each target make 22 points in contention, for a total of 1540 possible.

Events will be posted on the WSAA Calendar on the WSAA Forum by Kent and Brian as they are received. National and Sectional / Regional events we know of (and probably the proposed dates for WSAA Championship tournaments) will already be on the Calendar by time this Quiver is printed. The ability to post dates is reserved for these two folks and a few Board members, so you can't post them yourself, but registered Forum users can make comments or suggestions or provide additional info.

As your dates and those of other Clubs and Shops are posted, you can see any conflicts that develop and work them out with the other organizations involved. Then you can email the changes to Kent and Brian to update the Calendar. Our goal is to have the vast majority of conflicts worked out prior to the Convention.

Remember that all Calendar listings must be paid for (\$10 for each event) by 1 October. Dates submitted at Convention will require an increased fee - \$20 per event. Dates not paid for by the conclusion of Convention will not be on the Calendar.

## United States Archery Association Dress Code

*Rules for the Washington State FITA Field state, "USA Archery Dress code is strongly recommended but not required." Some may remember when USA Archery Dress Code required all white attire, or some specific colors such as blue or khaki. Others may have no idea as to what is required or prohibited. So, here is the statement, direct from USA Archery web site.*

In an effort to be more inclusive and to eliminate potential issues in recruiting new archers to USA Archery events, the USAA Board of Directors passed a revision to the current dress code. The revised dress code addresses the desired outcome and dictates less regarding specific colors allowed during competition. The general feel was to be sure our athletes presented themselves and the sport in a professional manner without dictating the specifics.

The new dress code went into effect Monday, May 31, 2010.

### USAA Dress Code:

1. All athletes and coaches must present a professional, athletic appearance while on the field. (Torn, ripped or badly faded clothing articles are not allowed.) **Clothing may be of any color.**
2. No camo or blue denim (jeans) may be worn at target events. Accessories such as trim on shirts, caps, quivers, armguards, footwear, etc., are permitted to be camo. **At field events, denim may be worn but camo may not be worn.**
3. Shorts, skorts and skirts must not be shorter than finger tip length while standing normally.
4. Men and women are required to wear upper garments covering the front and back of the body and covering the midriff when at full draw. Women's upper garments shall have a minimum strap of 3" or sleeves. Men's upper garments shall have short or long sleeves.
5. Sport/athletic shoes are recommended to all athletes and coaches during target events. Shoes must cover the entire foot.
6. At no time will any athlete or coach wear any article bearing any image or language to be considered offensive to others.



## Basic Archery Instructor (BAI) Course

Some additional info about this class:

- Must be at least age 18 for Certification. We are willing to have 17-year-old attend, and will hold their Certification paperwork until 18th birthday.
- Need not be already an archer to attend the class. We teach you the basics using the same methods YOU will use to teach other beginners.
- That said, this is primarily an Instructional Methods course, we hope any attendees plan to teach others!
- It is great for every Archery Club and Archery Shop to have a Certified Instructor among their membership or staff to help spread the sport of Archery!
- Great class for parents or grandparents who would like to learn SAFE and effective methods to teach!
