STUDENT ARCHERS COMPETE FOR STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

Archery students from around Washington State converged at Ellensburg WA on 19 March 2011 to compete in the Washington NASP State Championship. Site for the event was the Nicholson Pavilion at Central Washington University, and we FILLED the facility, using both the main gym and the fieldhouse to accommodate seven shooting lines of up to 50 archers each.

Students competed for individual awards for both boys and girls as well as for school team trophies in the categories of Elementary School, Middle School, and High School. This year's event included 280 students representing 20 schools from across the state, from Deer Park in the Northeast to Kelso in SW Washington and from Lynden in NW to Clarkston in the SE!

High scoring teams and top five individuals in each division received trophies and awards, and also qualify to participate in the National Championship to be held May 13-14 in Louisville Kentucky. High scoring male and female archer also received a special edition presentation bow donated by Matthews Archery.

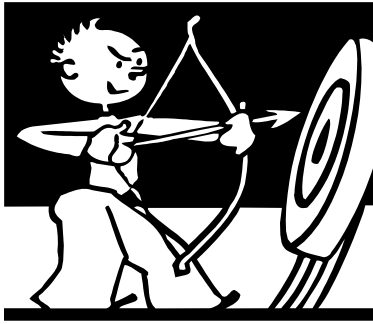
Top male archer was Zach Samek, a 9th grader from Deer Park High School. Top female archer was Kendra Strahm, grade 8, from Easton High School. Both these high-scoring individuals set new records for their competition category. This year's high scoring team is Deer Park High School, who will hold the Wolf Cup trophy for the year. The top two teams in each category (top three for high school) broke the previous Washington state records.

Results are listed inside this issue, and full results are posted on the Washington State Archery Association website: www.WashingtonArchery.org.

Students eligible to compete have been participating in the National Archery in the Schools Program "Archery - On Target for Life". Archers use standardized bows and arrows to shoot at bulls-eye targets at distances of 10 meters and 15 meters. Each archer shoots 15 arrows at each distance, with value of 10 points for a center hit descending to 1 point for a rim shot. Maximum score is 300 points for the round. Team competition aggregates the scores of the top four male, top four female, and next four overall scores, to total these twelve scores for each school.

Out of 280 students participating at NASP State Championship a total of 41 individuals were nominated for the Wolf Cup Spirit Award. NASP State Championship: A Coach's Perspective by Wayne VanZwoll

On Saturday 19 March 2011, nearly 300 students converged on Central Washington University with bows and arrows. No battle ensued -- instead, the archers lined up to compete in the state NASP (National Archery in the Schools Program) tournament. Bridgeport fielded its first team. "More than 4 million elementary, middle-school and high-school students have completed NASP classes," said Wayne van Zwoll, a NASP-certified volunteer instructor who introduced the program to Bridgeport in the 2009-10 school year. He taught the course with PE teacher Leah McDowell, who's also certified and now introducing archery in the Bridgeport Middle School. Van Zwoll brought NASP to the High School this year, where he coached archery in three PE classes indoors with teacher Brandon Boyd. A Bridgeport team resulted.

At the start, Principal Tamara Jackson and Superintendent Scott Sattler voiced expected concerns over safety. "But they've since been very supportive," said van Zwoll, adding that "no serious injuries have ever been reported in NASP programs. Archery is statistically much safer than football and basketball." He pointed out that "it's also for everyone. You don't have to be a star athlete or big and strong to shoot bullseyes." Nor must you be an upperclassman. A 10th-grade girl and a 9th-grade boy shot the top scores at the Ellensburg tournament last week. Van Zwoll, who holds a doctorate in wildlife science and has published extensively on the shooting sports, says archery gave early direction to his interest in the outdoors. "These youngsters can enjoy archery for a lifetime. NASP is a great start! No wonder it's spreading so fast!"

Best scores of girls on the Bridgeport team came from Margarita Chapa and Maria Landin, both in grade 9. Julio Perez, a senior, led the Bridgeport boys, followed by Kevin Soto, grade 9. Paul Ebrio, Chad Desjardins and Rodolfo Bejar were close behind. The event ran with an easy precision, thanks to the hard work of Linda Parker, Sherrie Crisp and Washington State Archery Association president Ed Forslof. The camaraderie of other archers, and shoulder-to-shoulder shooting, fostered a spirit of sportsmanship and courtesy. McDowell and van Zwoll and driver Dan Ward were delighted with this first-year performance of the Bridgeport team. They're already acquiring more equipment -- some of it through grants available to every school -- to bring more students to archery.

The tournament filled the Central Washington field house from early morning into the evening. Rows of targets lining two gymnasiums bristled with arrows as students from all corners of the state found that the bow, developed thousands of years ago, still has its magic!

BOWHUNTER EDUCATION: Annette Crews

Have you ever wondered how a bullet differs from an arrow? The shot impact is really important with whatever weapon you choose to hunt with. But what is the difference? Bullets kill by high-energy impact that crushes tissue and bone.

A broad head tipped arrow causes massive blood loss, causing the animal to lose consciousness and die.

Fish and Wildlife Commission Approves New Hunting Rules

OLYMPIA - The Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission approved new hunting rules for deer, elk and other game animals during a public meeting here April 8-9.

None of those proposals drew more public comments - both pro and con - than one that adds a four-point antler restriction for hunting white-tailed deer in game management units (GMU) 117 and 121 in Stevens County. In years past, hunters have been allowed to take any buck in those two GMUs, where white-tailed deer populations are considered depressed.

Another measure approved by the commission will reduce antlerless deer hunting in northeast Washington to help those deer populations recover from past hard winters.

In addition, the commission approved new rules that will:

- Increase permit hunting for antlerless elk in the Yakima area and for bulls and antlerless elk in the Mount St. Helens area, where elk populations are exceeding management objectives.
- Increase spring black bear hunting seasons and permits in western and northeast Washington to help reduce timber damage, address bear nuisance activity and expand hunting opportunities within population management guidelines.
- Authorize certain landowners in Asotin County to issue hunting permits to increase access to deer and elk hunting on private lands. Hunting permits for those properties also would be available to the public through WDFW's special permit drawing.
- Clarify public-conduct rules on private lands open for hunting under cooperative agreements with WDFW.

All of those new rules will be incorporated into the state's 2011-12 Big Game Hunting Seasons rule pamphlet, which will be available at sporting goods stores and other licensing outlets later this month. HUNTING VP: Ren Sarns

I attended two Archery Coalition meetings with the TBW and WSB over the last quarter. The first meeting was November 6 at Cedar River Bowman; Ray Crisp and I were both in attendance representing the WSAA. Various items were discussed in regards to Bowhunting in our State and what our steps need to be to attain our goals. We should have another meeting in June as there are some issues that need to be worked out before the WDFW starts their Season Setting process. During the February 12 meeting, the coalition decided on the five main goals to lobby the WDFW for. They are as follows:

1. Early elk season: get our days back that we have lost over the past two years and set our opening day as a fixed date versus the floating date it currently is. Our proposal is to go back to what we had prior to the current three-year plan, September 8-21. Seems the WDFW has tried sliding us towards the beginning of the month away from the prime rut hunting opportunity.

2. Expanding our deer hunting areas for mule deer. Open more GMU's to archery.

3. Regain our early deer hunting season, currently they have shortened it from what it had been in then past, when it ran until the end of September. We would like that last week to be added to our seasons.

4. Point restrictions for both Whitetail and Mule deer. Coalition members will testify to the Commission that we are steadfast against the 4-point restriction for whitetail and that the 3-point minimum is not gaining the desired results in increased Mule deer population.

5. Here is one I personally feel is way overdue. Mandatory Bowhunter education for all new bowhunters. Numerous states have this law and we are one of the few who does not. I am sure everyone has heard the stories of unethical archers; we see it on the news and in papers most every day. The arrow stuck in the head of a deer that someone takes a picture of in their yard. The goose with an arrow in its side ... the list goes on. I cannot say that bowhunter education will eliminate that, but it will keep the person who runs out the day before elk or deer season from buying a bow and some arrows, then heading out to shoot something. This last hunting season we had a hunter who was walking with an arrow nocked (with broadhead) run into and stab his hunting partner with his arrow, his partner died. If bowhunter education can prevent only some of this from happening it will be worthwhile. Another reason the Coalition wants this to be mandatory is that with the Multi-Season tags, we now have rifle hunters who may have never shot a bow going out and hunting with one.

I have also attended meetings regarding hunting over the past few months. The first was with Phil Anderson, WDFW Director, at his "round table" meeting held in Sedro Woolley on March 22. The meeting had 150 sportsmen in attendance and Phil was bombarded with many questions during the open portion of the meeting. Most questions were regarding the current status of the Elk herd in the Nooksack and the condition of the steelhead and salmon runs in the Skagit. I did get the opportunity to ask Phil a question in regards to the price increases for our hunting licenses and also gave him two more questions in writing for him to answer later. Those two questions were regarding our losing our early Elk season dates, or better put, why can we not get our original dates back, and the second being in regards to our losing the last week of September for early deer season. During this meeting I did get an opportunity to discuss other items with the Game Warden that was present in regards to Sierra Pacific and the possibility of opening their gates for deer season.

On 31 March I attended the Whidbey Camano Island Land Trust meeting regarding the proposed management plan for the Trilium Forest property. The meeting I attended was a focus group of hunters to discuss hunting with the President of the Land Trust and the project manager prior to developing their management plan. This property is 654 acres of prime blacktail habitat that at one time was a timber property, and is now being placed into a public use property. The President of the Land trust, the project manager, and the biologist, are all hunter-friendly and it appears we will have a great new area to hunt. They are facing staunch anti-hunting feedback from a few of the other user groups they have already met with, in particular the local hiking group and the horse club. There will be an open town meeting where they will present the management plan to the local public on 12 May. I am lobbying the three sportsman's clubs here on the Island to attend this meeting in strong numbers to show hunter presence.

I am still in need of volunteers to be a part of the Hunting Committee, I have put an article in The Quiver and also posted this on the WSAA Forum, yet I don't have anyone stepping forward. I need the District Trustees and board members to get the word out!

LETTER from a Member

The following letter from LONG-time WSAA Member Gale White was addressed to the Quiver Editor. I think our membership would like to see it!

I have recently seen the Quiver articles that include reprints from the original first publications of the early 1940's. It's good to see that you have been able to get these copies I gave to Diane Brereton some years ago, before her passing.

I am writing this letter because I still have most of the Quiver publications from September 1982 to the present time, along with Bowhunting manuals for 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998. I will need to dispose of this material sometime in the near future, so I would like to give it to anyone in the State who would like and could use any or all of it.

According to my inventory, the Quiver was published in approximately the following manner: September '82 thru March '83 by the Peninsula Gateway (Jerry Wonder); March '83 thru July '88 by Brereton Publishing co; August '88 thru February '89 by Pierce County Community Newspapers; March '89 thru March '1990 by Eagle Review Publishing co; April '90 thru February '94 by Ostlund Publishing Co; February '94 thru July '98 by Straight-to-the-Point Publishing, Seattle; and STP Publishing, Renton for August '98 thru May '99. Since then, starting in December '99 it has been published by WSAA, with Linda Parker as Editor.

However, prior to about 1982 it was published by the Northwest Archer as part of their regional publication. My memory of this publication is limited, as I only have about three of those old editions.

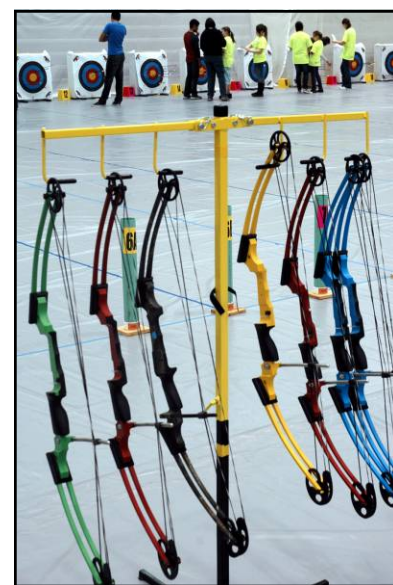

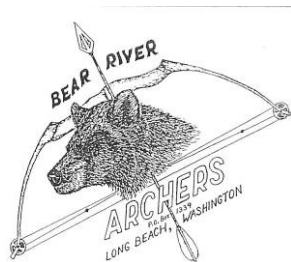

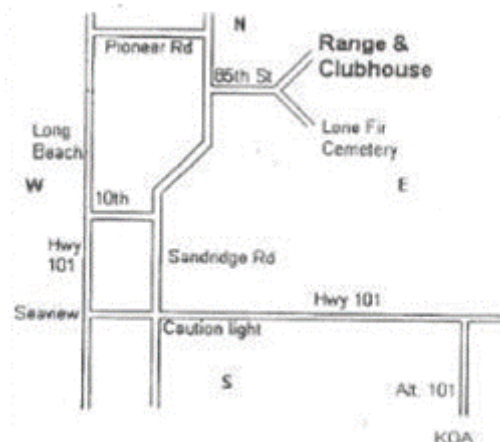
