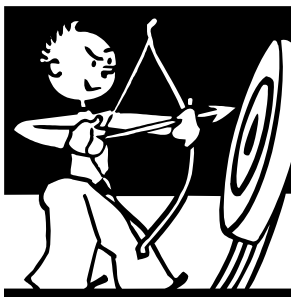

## NASP Coordinator: Dave Mack

WE'RE STILL GROWING! Since July we've confirmed the addition of a 900-student Middle School in Richland, a home school association in Kennewick, a Middle School and a Christian School in Kettle Falls and an Elementary School in Seattle. Plus we have a Middle School in Grapeview and a High School in Issaquah that are both very close to committing to the program.

We have confirmed another \$30,000 grant from WDFW to help us place equipment in new schools and help our volunteers cover their travel and overhead expenses.

Our application to become a 501(C)(3) tax-exempt organization supporting the growth and promotion of Archery has been approved by the Internal Revenue Service.

AND WE'RE STILL STUMBLING! While the program has grown very well, our leadership team has not. Our team of a half dozen regular volunteers has been focused on growing the program in our schools and not in building a good working system that will allow for the delegation and oversight necessary to help the Program AND the Team grow. This has created an increasingly larger work load on those of us that have been keeping the program running and less time to go back and create the systems we need to run more efficiently and to help spread the work load.

A couple of years ago we began casting about to find a business application that would be allow us to use a common data base for contacts and files that all volunteers could access from their homes but we had trouble finding anything that would solve all of our problems, not cost a lot of money and was still easy to use. Recently, while discussing our dilemma with a new volunteer in Port Angeles, he referenced a program that he has been using to keep his family running smoothly and thought it might work for us. Our review of it looks very promising and we hope to have it up and running soon. This program will be remotely located so it is not dependent on nesting in a volunteer's home computer, it'll be password accessible to existing and new volunteers and up dates will be immediately available to everyone with a password. This should provide a huge improvement in helping us show new volunteers what we do and how to help in their area.

NOW FOR THE TOUGH NEWS! My family situation has changed significantly this year. The result of this change has been a severely reduced ability to devote much time to anything but family. I will not be able to continue as the Washington NASP Coordinator after the first of next year. Our current plans include selling our home and moving out of state next spring. I will continue as a volunteer until that time but as of January 1, 2012 I request that WSAA appoint a new NASP Coordinator. Please let our President, Mr. Ed Forslof know if you would like to be considered for this post.

## National Target Championships, Easton JOAD Nationals Head to Hamilton, Ohio Dates Set for 27 June to 1 July 2012

Colorado Springs, CO - Joyce Park in Hamilton, Ohio has successfully hosted two National Target Championship events.

Visitors to the park in July of 2009 and 2010 witnessed the happy embraces, the high fives, the struggles and the triumphs that are part and parcel of this national championship event. The "thwack" of arrows hitting bales, the symphony of hundreds of clickers and releases going off together, and the beep of the timing system will echo through Joyce Park once again, as National Target Championships return to Hamilton from June 27 to July 1, 2012.

Next year, however, the event will evolve to include the Easton JOAD Nationals, the youth championship event that determines the JOAD Grand National Champions. According to USA Archery CEO Denise Parker, "This should be a great event combining our Youth and Adult national events. I expect this to be the event of the year and an opportunity to celebrate our sport. The timing also allows us to celebrate the send off of our team headed to the Olympic Games in London."

Though specific event details have yet to be released, those who have competed in Hamilton before have expressed their pleasure at the tournament's return to Ohio, praising the location for its "drivability" for archers in many parts of the United States, as well as the close proximity of several major airports, and ease of access from local hotels to the competition venue.

## Black Bear Hunters Can Test Identification Skills Online at WDFW Website

OLYMPIA – Black bear hunters can test their bear species identification skills through a new interactive program on the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife's (WDFW) website.

The program, at [http://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/bear\\_cougar/bear/index.html](http://wdfw.wa.gov/hunting/bear_cougar/bear/index.html), includes information on how to correctly identify black bears and grizzly bears, and gives hunters a chance to test their identification skills.

Grizzly bears are protected under state and federal endangered species laws. Whereas black bears are classified as a game species.

"This test was developed to help black bear hunters be sure of their targets," said Dana Base, a WDFW northeast district wildlife biologist. "We encourage hunters to test their knowledge about the two species before going afield."

Hunting season for black bear opened September 1 in several areas of the state, including the northeast district, where hunters sometimes encounter grizzly bears. That district spans Pend Oreille, Stevens and Ferry counties and includes game management units 101-121.

Up to 50 grizzlies are estimated to roam the Selkirk Mountains of northeast Washington, north Idaho and southeastern British Columbia. Less than a dozen are believed to roam the North Cascades of north central Washington and south central British Columbia.

## Volunteers Needed To Facilitate Access for Elk Hunts near Mount St. Helens

OLYMPIA – The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is seeking volunteers to participate in a cooperative effort that has provided hunters access to 250,000 acres of private timberlands near Mount St. Helens in the last four years.

For the fifth year, the Weyerhaeuser Company is prepared to give hunters holding special elk permits additional motorized access to a large portion of the St. Helens Tree Farm, provided that enough volunteers can be found to assure a safe and orderly hunt.

WDFW is seeking dozens of volunteers to help in that effort during special elk-permit seasons scheduled from September through January.

Key tasks for volunteers include orienting hunters, staffing access points, and maintaining safety buffers between hunters and active Weyerhaeuser operations, said Sandra Jonker, regional wildlife manager for WDFW.

“The success of this program depends on our ability to recruit a dedicated team of volunteers to help us facilitate this additional access,” Jonker said. “The amount of timberland that can be opened to hunting is directly proportionate to the number of volunteers that sign up, so participation is vital to the continuation of this program.”

Jonker noted that the program attracted 54 volunteers in 2007, 61 in 2008, 49 in 2009, and 46 volunteers last year.

Participants will be required to attend an orientation session, scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. at the following times and locations:

Volunteer organizations, led by the Southwest Washington Land Access Coalition, have secured funding to reimburse volunteers for mileage accrued for participating in the program.

Other partners in the program include Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Eyes in the Woods, Cowlitz Game & Anglers, Washington State Archery Association, Yacolt Burn Sportsmen Club, Vancouver Wildlife League, and the Washington State Bowhunters.

The partnership between WDFW, Weyerhaeuser and the volunteer organizations is designed to expand hunter access to areas of the St. Helens Tree Farm that lie within Game Management Units 520 (Winston), 524 (Margaret), 550 (Coweman) and 556 (Toutle).

Jonker said the access program – combined with the issuance of additional special hunting permits – has helped to increase harvest levels over the past three years throughout the Mount St. Helens elk herd. That is a key goal under the department’s management plan for the herd, the largest of 10 elk herds in the state.

“The department’s management plan calls for reducing the herd size to bring the number of animals into balance with available habitat,” Jonker said. “We want to thank Weyerhaeuser and all the volunteers participating in the St. Helens Land Access Program for their help in this joint effort.”

## Fish and Wildlife Commission Amends Cougar Hunting Regulations

OLYMPIA — The Washington Fish and Wildlife Commission approved amendments to cougar hunting regulations during a conference call 19 August.

The commission, which sets policy for the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), amended cougar hunting regulations in six counties in eastern Washington, where a pilot project authorizing cougar hunting with the aid of dogs was not extended by the Legislature this year.

That amendment increases cougar hunting opportunities without the aid of dogs in Klickitat, Chelan, Okanogan, Ferry, Stevens and Pend Oreille counties to continue to meet management objectives in those areas.

In addition, the commission modified the criteria for determining when cougars are removed to address public concerns about pet and livestock depredation and personal safety. The change allows for cougar removals when complaints confirmed by WDFW staff in a given game management unit exceed the five-year average.

WDFW game managers recommended the amendments to cougar hunting regulations as an interim measure until the 2012-14 hunting season package is developed. **Washington Indoor FITA Championship is scheduled for 19-20 November at Spokane and Nock Point**

## Washington Indoor FITA Rules

### GENERAL

**GENERAL** Please refer to FITA Constitution and Rules, Book 3

1. The Indoor FITA Championships may be composed of two FITA I rounds. The distance shot will be 18 meters, using the multi-color 40 cm. indoor target, or three-spot target face. (Cub and Bowman Recurve and all Yeoman use the 60 cm face). Senior, Master, Junior and Cadet Compound score the inner ten ring. (Compound Fingers score the full ten-ring). Each archer using the 40 cm target may choose the single spot or triangular three-spot target.

2. The round shot consists of 20 ends of 3 arrows each, total 60 arrows. There is a two-minute time limit for each end.

3. **DIVISIONS:**

Senior Men or Women – Recurve, Compound, Compound Fingers, Barebow

Master 50+ Men or Women – Recurve, Compound, Compound Fingers

Master 60+ Men or Women – Recurve, Compound, Compound Fingers

Master 70+ Men or Women – Recurve, Compound, Compound Fingers

Junior Boys or Girls (20 years and younger) – Recurve, Compound

Cadet Boys or Girls (17 years and younger) – Recurve, Compound

Cub Boys or Girls (14 years and younger) – Recurve, Compound

Bowman Boys or Girls (12 years and younger) – Recurve, Compound

Yeoman Boys or Girls (8 years and younger) – Recurve, Compound

\* An archer is considered "20 (or 17, 14, 12) or younger" until the end of the year containing the 20th (or 17, 14, 12)th birthday.

\*\* An archer is considered "50 (or 60, 70) or older" from the beginning of the year containing the 50th (or 60, 70)th birthday.

4. **STYLES:** All archers will follow FITA equipment. An equipment inspection by the official will occur prior to the first day of shooting for all shooters. Maximum arrow diameter of 9.3 millimeters. The following is a basic overview

**Recurve Division** – Recurve bow, Sights, stabilizers, compensators are OK. Archers may not use a peep sight, magnifying lens, mechanical release or any electronic devices on their bow.

**Compound Division** – Peak bow weight not to exceed 60 lbs. Electric or electronic devices on bow are not allowed. Multiple-pin sights SHALL be acceptable in the compound division.

**Barebow** – Recurve Bow, No sights or stabilizers. Must fit completely fit within a 12.2 cm diameter ring when unstrung.

**Compound Fingers Division** – Will be recognized for Senior, Master 50+, Master 60+, and Master 70+. Same as Compound Division except no Release Aids. Multiple-pin sights SHALL be acceptable in compound fingers division

5. All participants must be current USA Archery or WSAA / NFAA members who are residents of Washington.
6. Nonmembers will be permitted to join the NFAA or USA Archery prior to the start of the tournament.
7. USA Archery Dress code is strongly recommended but not required..
8. The host club of the Washington State FITA Field tournament is responsible for paying the USA Archery Qualifying sanction fee 45 days prior to the event and securing judges
9. All scoring must be double scoring. All scorecards must be signed by the individual archer and two other archers (three different signatures are required). All junior shooting shall be supervised and their scorecards signed by an adult.
10. Tied scores will be decided by the greatest number of 10's. If this is also a tie, then the tying archer with the greatest number of 9's shall win. If a tie still exists, then contestants will be declared tied, and equal awards will be given.
11. Any rules not covered above shall be referred to the Tournament Committee.
12. Any grievances must be presented in writing to the Tournament Committee, and be accompanied by a \$25.00 fee.

## Basic Archery Instructor (BAI) Training

During the past month, the Washington NASP team has taught two BAI classes, the first at KBH Archers in Belfair on 20 August, and the second on 10 September at Kettle Falls. Belfair attracted a large, mixed group of 13, including five teachers, four who plan to start a "Centershot" program at their church, one Scout leader, and three from KBH Archers. At Kettle Falls, there were six graduates - four teachers and two parents.

Our next BAI class is scheduled for Saturday, 8 October, at Enterprise Middle School in West Richland. Ed Forslof is the lead instructor for this class; contact him if you would like to attend. We are in early planning stages of a class which will PROBABLY happen in November, in the Seattle area. The contact for that class is Linda Parker. Ed's and Linda's contact info is on the Board list.

Each class presents a very full, all-day agenda and a hands-on opportunity to work with the same equipment and coaching techniques that are used in the NASP classroom. Participants must be at least age 18 for Certification, and need not be already an archer to attend the class. We teach you the basics using the same methods YOU will use to teach other beginners.

This Instructional Methods course will prepare you to teach others, whether in the school setting or at your range! Every Archery Club and Archery Shop should have a Certified Instructor among their membership or staff to help spread the sport of Archery!
